

Insurance on cotton will be available to North Carolina farmers for the first time this year through the Federal Crop Insurance Corfor the first time this year through the Federal Crop Insurance Cor-poration, according to G. Tom Scott, of State College, chairman of the State AAA Committee. The insurance, like that on wheat crops for the past two years, protects producers against unavoidable losses, such as drouth, floods, diseases, and insects. Premium rates for individual farms, based on losses during the past seven years, now are being com-plied in county AAA offices, and will be available to growers within about a week. The insurance is issued to land owners, farm operators and tenants, and protection may be obtained for either 50 or 75 per cent of normal production during past years. Applications will be ac-cepted by county AAA offices until the deadline on March 16.
