It is estimated that about 9,000,-000 men registered Monday, bringing the total number of registrants in the nation to 27,000,000, since 18,-000.000 men had been listed at the two preceding registrations.

Another regsitration will be held in the spring to list all men between the ages of 18 to 20 and 45 to 65, age brackets representing some 15,500,-000 in all. It is believed the men in this age group will be held for possible civilian protection and war production jobs, and they will bring to more than 42,000,000 the total registered manpower of the nation.
