

Price Control Order Effective May 18 on Most All Necessities

Expect To Stabilize Living Costs Near Figure Prevailing in March

Merchants and business houses in Washington County are giving consideration to plans for complying with the price-freezing order issued by Price Administrator Leon Henderson Tuesday night. Rigid regulations have been promulgated to control prices and prevent inflation. It is believed by competent authorities that living costs will be reduced by about 1 1/2 per cent when the ruling goes into effect, May 18 for practically all retail establishments.

The order provides that the highest wholesale and retail prices prevailing during last March should be the absolute maximums which may be charged, effective May 18, for countless articles, including bread, beef, pork, canned foods, coffee, clothing, cigarettes, drugs, toiletries, furniture, home appliances, hardware, and other so-called indispensables.

It was announced that on and after May 18, retail establishments dealing in all commodities except those specifically excepted, must not post prices higher than the maximum charged last March. Hence, if the price of a can of beans was a maximum of 10 cents in March but rose to 12 cents in April, the grocer will have to return to the 10-cent price on May 18.

Beginning July 1, no one may charge more for service at retail in connection with a commodity than he charged during March. Thus, the rates charged by auto repair shops.

Farmers Advised To Plant Large Number Acres of Lespedeza

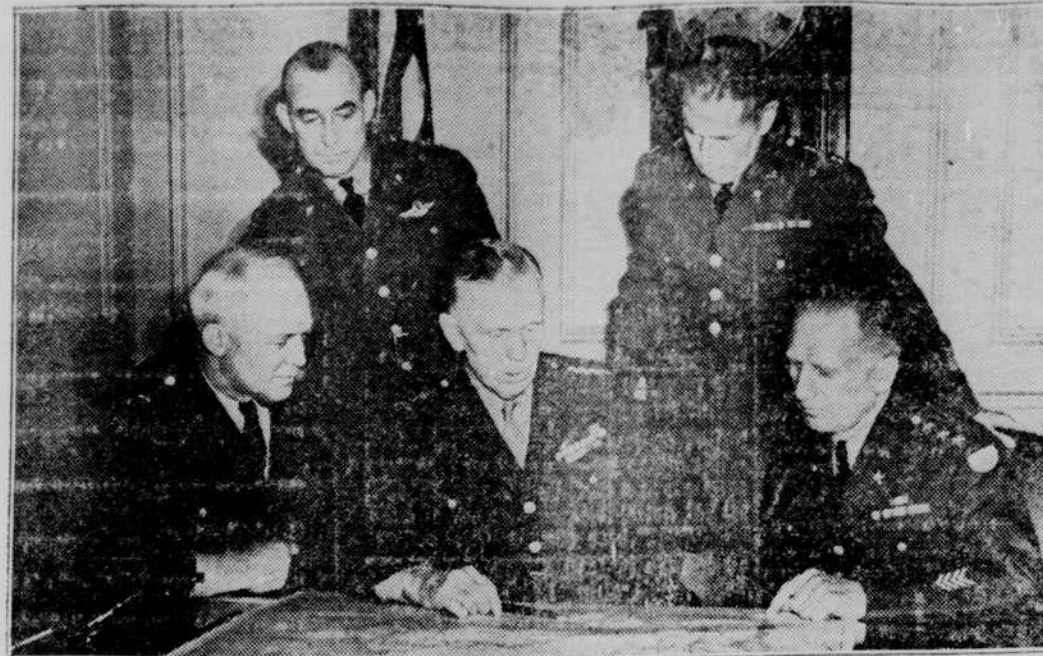
State AAA Official Urges Plan for Earning Soil Building Payments

Farmers of North Carolina are urged by E. Y. Floyd, state AAA executive assistant, to make every effort to earn as many soil building practice payment units as possible this year by seeding lespedeza.

Floyd said field surveys show there is still a good supply of lespedeza seed in the hands of retail and wholesale dealers over the state, and added that there is still time to seed the crop. Many farmers plant lespedeza over their small grains but many others also seed in the open field and this is the best time for such planting.

He said seeding lespedeza earns the farmer one-half unit, 75 cents, for each acre. It is a hardy, perennial, drought-resistant, and grows in all soils, except heavy, wet, clay soils. It is a good cover crop for all crops, and its roots are a good source of nitrogen for the soil.

On and after May 18, all retail stores must post the new controlled prices of all "cost of living" commodities within plain sight of their customers. The commodities most significant in the budgets of the average low and middle income families include such staples as cigarettes, aspirin tablets, toothbrushes, ice cream, virtually all clothing, most meats, canned foods, household appliances, such as radios, vacuum cleaners, sewing machines, china, rugs and other furnishings and hardware.

May Quota of Tires, Tubes, Retreads Received by County Rationing Board

The Washington County Rationing Board has received the May tire and tube quota for the county, in some ways it compares fairly well with the April quota and in some ways it does not, according to W. I. Whitley, chairman.

The May quota is: for passenger cars, 4 tires, 18 retread, 11 tubes; for trucks, 17 tires, 27 retreads and 23 tubes. By comparison, the April quota was as follows: passenger cars, 7 new tires, 32 retreads, 19 tubes; for trucks 19 tires, 17 retreads, 18 tubes.

It was learned that an amendment to the tire rationing regulations makes it possible for certificates to be issued enabling any

person who owns, operates, or controls certain qualified vehicles owned by states, or owned and operated by motor vehicle operators registered with the Interstate Commerce Commission, to establish an emergency reserve, in excess of the one spare of each size now allowed, of tires and tubes equal to 10 percent of the total number of wheels that that person has on the road.

From time to time, Mr. Whitley has been successful in getting a small increase in the number of tires and retreads issued to this county, but, nevertheless, there are a number of persons in the county who are on the eligible list but who will not be able to get tires, tubes or retreads.

This crop is one of the best adapted legumes for the state as a whole, it is fool-proof, and all small grain should be over-planted with lespedeza where possible.

"Indications are that water solu-

ble nitrogen will be short of demands about 50 to 60 percent this year, and no one knows how short it will be in 1943," he said. "By growing lespedeza, the farmer can produce for himself a large portion of the nitrogen needed for his crops."

He declared lespedeza is one of the best nitrogen-gathering crops grown in the state, and that this crop is becoming more and more important with such a large volume of commercial nitrates going into the manufacture of munitions for war.
