Ten Plymouth Area Men Training To Be Combat Engineers

At Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. Doing Intensive Work In Service Training

Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.—Ten men from the Plymouth area, who recently entered military service, have arrived at the Engineer Replacement Training Center here for an intensive training program in preparation for combat engineer duty. They are assigned to the 7th Engineer Training Group (colored). Training will include basic subjects like close and extended order drill, manual of arms, rifle marksmanship and combat principles as well as the functions of military engineering—use of tools and equipment, building of fixed and floating bridges, demolitions and construction of roads and obstacles.
