

The Share-the-Meat program is purely a voluntary one at the present time, and while farmers will be asked to limit their consumption to an allowance set up for the country as a whole, I doubt if it will affect but very few on the basis of average yearly consumption. Comparatively few of our farmers average more than the consumption allotment requested of all of the people.

Farm machinery has now been released. The county office does not have, as yet, the printed forms necessary for making applications for new machinery but these forms should be here as well as lal instructions, by December 10th and then all new farm machinery applications in the county will be acted upon by the rationing board.

Washington County has now been designated as a producer of high oil content sowbeans and growers in the card "Air Corps."
