

#### Electricians Signed Two Weeks Ago New contracts governing wages

and working conidtions at the plant of the North Carolina Pulp Company here were signed this week by representatives of the management and three of the four AFLaffiliated unions representing employees of the big mill. Separate negotiations were conducted by the electricians' union, and that contract was signed about two weeks

New Contracts Signed This

Week With Three Unions;

Main feature of the new contract is a 5 per cent general increase or all hourly paid employees. In addition, fringe benefits applicable to the hospital insurance program, annual sick leave, and increase in minimum retirement pay provided by the company will increase the accrual to the approximately 900 mployees affected.

Under the new rates, minimum pay for hourly employees who worked 90 days or more will be \$.51 per hour. From there the 5 per cent wage increase means up to a maximum base rate of \$3.01 per hour for machine tenders on the No. 3 paper machine. The range of the increase varies from 7 to 14 cents per hour, depending on the type of work performed. In addition, a number of individual job adjustments were made, affecting about 125 people, their increases ranging from 2 to 12 cents per hour.

According to a union spokesman, the hospital insurance program at he plant was improved in several particulars, being increased from \$8 to \$10 per day in benefits, with the company paying the entire premium for each employee, although the employees will continue to pay Five Hurt in Two the cost of insurance for their dependents. An annual sick-leave the cost of insurance for their deplan was put into effect, providing for 40 hours' pay to employees af-ter the loss of two full weeks due to sickness or accident. The minimum retirement pay for employees was increased from \$100 to \$125 per month, at no added cost to the employees.

Terms of the new contracts are retroactive to August 1, when the old contract expired. Negotiations were started July 15, with agreement reached early on main features of the contracts. Subsequent conferences were held to work out details of the contracts, which were approved by membership of three of the unions on August 17.
