

Washington County relinquished its turn for the presidency and the annual meeting next year, and Melin Daniels, of Manteo, was elected to succeed A. Corey, of Jamesville, as president. It was voted to hold the annual meeting in Dare in conjunction with dedication of the Croatan Sound Bridge next fall.

M. A. Matthews, of Columbia and Engelhard, was re-elected treasurer and the president was authorized to appoint his own secretary. Governor Luther Hodges address-
