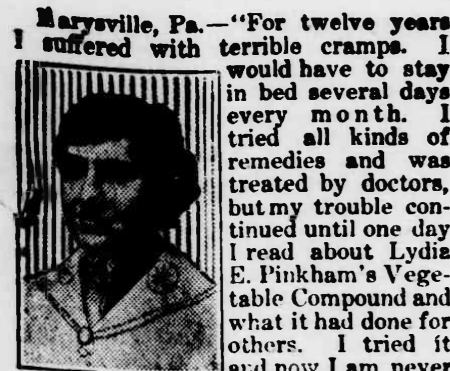

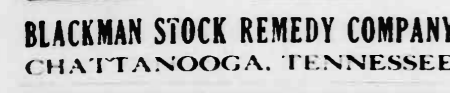

IMMIGRATION BILL PASSED OVER VETO

WAS FIRST VETO OF PRESIDENT WILSON TO BE OVERRIDEN. BY CONGRESS.

THREE TO ONE IN THE SENATE

Japan's Protest Against Asiatic Exclusion Section Disregarded—International Situation Up.

Washington.—Congress has overridden a veto by President Wilson for the first time, and enacted into law the immigration bill with its long-fought literacy test provision. The Senate voted 62 to 19 to pass the measure notwithstanding the veto and in spite of eleven-hour information that Japan again had protested against the language of the Asiatic exclusion section.

The House overturned the veto by a vote of 287 to 106, so the Senate's action ends the contest of 20 years' standing in which three presidents have repudiated similar bills passed by Congress.

The international situation was brought into the closing debate in the Senate, Senator Reed calling attention to the Japanese objection and pleading that nothing be done at this time to disturb or impair the country's relations with a friendly nation. Senator Smith, of South Carolina, chairman of the Immigration Committee, answered with the declaration that the present state of international affairs emphasized the necessity of a pure, homogeneous American people such as the bill was intended to protect.

Senator Phelan, who voted to override the veto, had voted against original passage of the bill. Senators who voted for the original bill, but would not vote to pass it over the veto, were Hollis, Johnson of South Dakota and Thompson, Democrats; and Sherman and Smith of Michigan, Republicans.

PERSHING LEADS ARMY FROM MEXICAN SOIL.

Columbus, N. M.—Major General Pershing rode out of Mexico at 10:15 a. m. Monday, February 5, at the head of more than 10,000 soldiers of the American punitive expedition.

A short time later, he mounted the little handstand in front of the headquarters at Columbus and as the band played “When Johnnie Comes Marching Home” gave the order for the troops to pass in review. Hard as nails, the expeditionary soldiers passed in review like the functioning of a perfectly made machine. After the infantry came the cavalry column, followed by the artillery and auxiliary units.

SAFE PASSAGE GRANTED TO BERNSTORFF AND STAFF.

Washington.—Tuesday, February 13, the whole corps of German officials in the United States, including Count and Countess von Bernstorff, the Embassy suite, and consuls from all parts of the country, will sail from New York for Germany. Reservations for more than 200 persons have been engaged on the big Scandinavian liner Frederick VIII, leaving New York February 13 for Christiania. England and France have granted safe passage.

CONGRESS PAVING WAY FOR DEMANDED LEGISLATION.

Washington.—Congress began earnestly to pave the way for legislation that may be demanded by any development in the international crisis. Still hopeful that the break with Germany will not involve the United States in war, leaders of both parties recognized that preparations should not be delayed, and there was unusual activity in the naval, military and revenue committees of the Senate.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 11

JESUS AND THE WOMAN OF SAMARIA.

LESSON TEXT—John 4:5-14, 24, 26. GOLDEN TEXT—Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners.—1 Tim. 1:15.

This is a lesson of one of the wayside ministries of Jesus. It occurred incidentally while he was on his way to his great preaching and teaching experience at Galilee. It was a by-product of his very busy life, yet it is one of the most famous interviews and one of the best examples of how to do personal work that is found in the scriptures. The larger part of the first year of Christ's ministry was spent in Judea. Jesus did not baptize, but his disciples did, doubtless for the same reason, though in a less degree, than why Paul refused to baptize converts (1 Cor. 1:13-16). All but one of the disciples of Jesus were Galileans and Jesus spent about a year and nine months of his ministry in that place.

1. **Jesus Rested (vv. 4-6).** To reach Galilee from Judea Jesus “must needs go through Samaria,” not that there were not other ways that he might have traveled, but rather that it was worth while to go out of his way in order to bring the water of life to this needful woman. Jacob's well was at a parting of the roadway near to the city of Sychar. Few places in the land save Jerusalem had so much Bible history connected with them (Gen. 22:6; Joshua 8:33; Acts 7:16; 1 Kings, 12:1, etc.). The well was originally about 100 feet deep and 7 1/2 feet in diameter, but it has been filled up with accumulations of rubbish so it is now only about 7 1/2 feet deep. Christ was weary in his work, but not of it, and “sat thus” (by the well); literally, on the low wall built around it. The sixth hour was probably about midday. There is comfort in consideration of the fact that as a man Jesus was willing to meet this woman of bad character.

2. **Jesus Holds Conversation (vv. 7-14).** Notice the gentle way in which Jesus speaks, and that he began on the ground of their common need. He asks this needed favor that he might confer a greater one, ignoring the prejudice which existed against the Samaritans. Water was the thing uppermost in the woman's mind. She did not grant his simple request, and her reply indicated that racial differences were a very real barrier. They hinder our work even yet. The surprise, perhaps pleasure, that a Jew should ask a favor of her seems to have greatly impressed the woman, and aroused her curiosity. In verse 10 Jesus tells the woman that there are two things she must needs know: (1) the wondrous gift of God, that is the Holy Spirit (Luke 11:13; Acts 2:23-38); (2) the wonderful man who had asked of her “Give me to drink.” Had she known these things she would have asked him for the living water. All that was needful was simply to ask. The Holy Spirit is the living water (John 6:33). The woman does not seem to have comprehended what Jesus was trying to teach, yet he was patient, and won her as a convert. He told her that everyone who came to that well would thirst again (v. 13). The world's fountains do not satisfy, fountains of wealth, fame, pleasure or carnal gratification, or even learning. He then tells her of the living water (v. 14) of which the drinker should never thirst, that it would satisfy who-soever drinks, and was to be everlasting (John 7:37-39). The one who receives the Holy Spirit within has a perennial, eternal spring of life, joy and satisfaction springing up within him. Before the woman received the water of which he was speaking there had to come a conviction of sin (vv. 16-19); hence his remark, “Go call thy husband.” This was a sharp thrust into her life and heart. She tried to parry the thrust with a technical question, yet he comes back with a great revelation of the nature of God and the worship which God accepts, revealing his Messiahship (vv. 15-26). As is indicated, she does not seem to have comprehended the nature of the request which Jesus had made (v. 15); therefore he began this searching of her life in order to prepare her to receive the water of life which he wanted to bestow. This knowledge of her secret life by a perfect stranger who had never even seen her before was an evidence to the woman of spiritual endowment: “Sir I perceive that thou art a prophet.” She then entered upon a theological argument (v. 20) which Jesus answered very simply, saying that the worship of the Father is not to be restricted by time or place (v. 21).

At this point the disciples return and the woman goes into the village. Jesus, lifting up his eyes to the citizens who were coming out at her invitation, exclaims, “Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest,” thereby emphasizing still further the “personal evangelism” thought which is uppermost in his lesson.

She thirsted (v. 14), she received (vv. 25, 26), she became a spring (vv. 28-29) which supplied others (v. 39).

The water of life fully satisfies, and it is a spring (v. 10); it continually satisfies.

In every case the post-bellum history of former great wars records a continuance of the business activity which the wars themselves had stimulated. After Waterloo England entered upon the greatest era of industrial and commercial expansion she had ever known. The British empire of commerce was, in fact, made possible by the Napoleonic wars. After our Civil war the United States and the entire American continent, north and south, had a boom which lasted until 1873. After the Franco-Prussian war, France, despite her defeat and the indemnity of five billion francs she paid Germany, became more prosperous than ever in her history.

The reason for this seeming paradox is that the activities of reconstruction are more stimulating than those of destruction, because they are inspired by hope rather than by vindictiveness or revenge. People work more eagerly to live than to die.

In so far as America is concerned, I cannot see that we have anything to regret or fear if peace should come tomorrow on terms that would guarantee the future integrity of international law.

A few mushroom munition plants would be dismantled and there would be some relocation of labor, but the more important and permanent business of the country would probably boom.

The money which the war has provided us will permit of the re-financing of our railways and other industrial and distributive enterprises upon a scale that will be adequate to our present development and the amount of money thus put in circulation will far exceed any profit that we may reap from a continuance of the war.
