J. P. Martin of Tampa, Fla., through his representative, H. S. Anderson of Hendersonville, bought at public sale Monday at the court house the 800-acre tract of J. M. Lyday lands known as the See-Off property.

Mr. Martin's son was recently in Brevard and made an examination of the property. It is announced that he will develop it by building a good road and a lake at the place cleared by the Appalachian Club Estates a few years ago.

The property was sold under decree of the Superior court of Henderson county by W. W. Lyday, administrator and commissioner. The purchase price was \$18,655.

**MORE ON TRAINING CHILDREN**

Editor, News:

We should not let our children play or go all the time. Learn them to work and be content anywhere. If your lives have fallen into some quiet, unpretentious place, do not complain that it is dull and commonplace and there is nothing to live for. Why, dear heart, there is no place on earth so bleak and barren, so quiet and lonely, so wind-swept and rain-beaten but there is a great deal to live for right there. And when you have grown a little larger you will see with clear eyes; and you will, perhaps, look back to the farm and wish—oh, how you will wish!—that you had been happy and content in that simple life. You will know then that it is better to live well a humdrum life than to wear out body, mind and soul in a fever of gaiety and stretch out your empty hands always to something you cannot seize. Better to sing babies to sleep in the soft twilight that folds down over a modest country home and to dwell forever away from the lights, the roar, the sin and the temptation of the city with a clean heart and a pure soul than to let the city's unrest creep into your pulses and set them a mad chase after death. 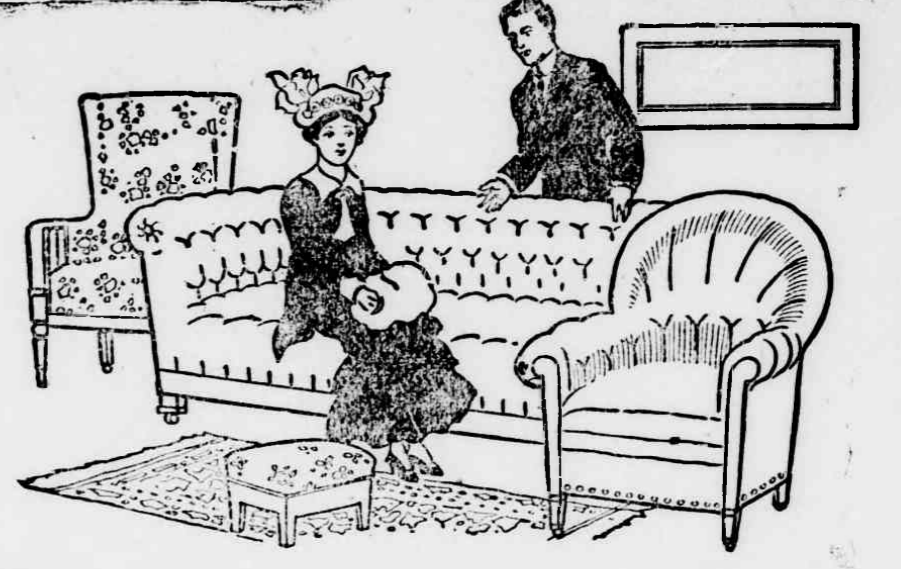

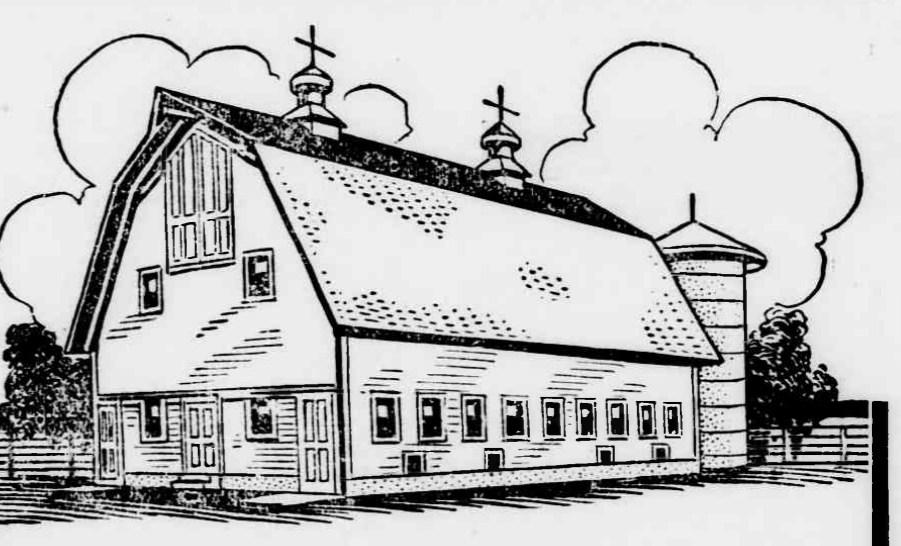
