Washington is rapidly completing its preparations for the second inauguration of Woodrow Wilson as president of the United States.

President Wilson has notified the inaugural committee that he does not favor the customary inaugural ball, and accordingly that feature will be eliminated.

Inaugural Takes Place March 5.
