71.70 Joseph S. Silverstein, who is erecting the finest residence in Breyard and one among the finest in the whole of Wertern Carolina, bas 22.02 along with other modern touches introduced some innovations for the town in the way of electrical 3.19 arrangements. The lighting sys tem, which was installed by M. M. 11.30 Chapman, is quite elaborate and up-to-date. The house is a large one and being well equipped elec-13.04 trically means quite a financial out-9.16 lay in electrical arrangements to say nothing of the fixtures, which 5.44 have not been installed.

As one approaches the house from Main street he will be greeted 5.11 by a row of lights leading from the entrance to the house. These lights will be controlled by pushing a button on the front entrance to the ouse, which moves a remote controlled switch in the basement.

In each of the three gables of the house will be a 100 watt light, which will be controlled by switch-15 20.79 es at three places in the house. When three gable lights are thrown 3.42 on the entire grounds surrounding the home will be flooded with light. They will serve their purpose should any unusual noises be heard around the premises at night.

Quite a novel feature will be the automatically controlled lights in all closed closets. The lights are automatically turned on and off upon opening and closing the door of the closet.

The living room will be the most elaborately equipped one in the house. Arrangements have been made for having about any kind of 26.70 light desired at any point in the room in addition to the chandelier.

This is perhaps the biggest job Mr. Chapman ever had and he naturally feels proud of the distinction of having received the work. He has also been awarded the contract 5.54 to wire the residence of R. H. Zachary, which will perhaps be the second costliest home in Brevard.
