EXEMPTION BOARD NAMED BY PRESIDENT

Dr. C. W. Hunt, Ora L. Jones, and G. E. Lathrop were notified by telegram from Governor Bickett on Monday that they had been appointed by President Wilson to act as a county exemption board to pass on the draft which the government will make on this county for military service.

The duties of this board have not yet been made public, but it is understood that the government will draw from the list of men registered on June 5 the quota of this county, each individual of which will then be passed upon by the board until the required number has been obtained.

CERTIFICATE OF DISSOLUTION

To all to whom these presents may come—greeting:
Whereas, It appears to my satisfaction, by duly authenticated record of the proceedings for the voluntary dissolution thereof by the unanimous consent of all the stockholders, deposited in my office, that the Brown Patton company, a corporation of this State, whose principal office is situated in the town of Pisgah Forest, county of Transylvania, State of North Carolina, H.
