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TOXAWAY LUMBER CO. CONNECTS WITH R. R.

Big Flume Line on West Prong of French Broad Ready to Transport Lumber—Two Saw Mills in Operation.

The Toxaway Lumber Company, of which W. J. Owen is president and O. W. Clayton secretary and treasurer, has been making preparations for the shipping of wood and lumber from a large territory drained by the west prong of the French Broad and its tributaries.

A large flume line about four miles in length has been finished to the lower terminal point near the Southern railway about two miles above Rosman.

Grading for a side track from the railroad to the end of the flume line has also been completed by the company.

As the new school house is not yet completed, the school was compelled to use the church auditorium and two rooms beneath for opening and carrying on the work for a few weeks.

All the teachers this session are new to the school. Mr. Ponder is from Mars Hill and was formerly principal of the high school at Mills River.

The new building, which is being constructed near the old one, will have, when completed, four class rooms, a library room, a music room, four cloak rooms, and one large hall.

REV. MCDANIEL RESIGNS PASTORATE OF CHURCH

Pastor of Baptist Church Resigns Charge After three years of Successful Ministry.

At a congregational meeting of the Baptist church last Sunday, Rev. A. W. McDaniel tendered his resignation as pastor, to take effect some time in December.

Following a revival held here in November, 1914, Mr. McDaniel became pastor of the church in December of the same year, and will, with the coming December, have finished three years of pastoral work in this place.

No other call has as yet been accepted by him, and his plans for the future are not yet definitely made.
