TEACHERS MEETING ON SATURDAY DECEMBER 8

Second Meeting of Year to be Held at Graded School; Interesting Program Prepared; Reading and Spelling to Have Prominent Place.

The program committee met with the county superintendent at Brevard on Saturday, November 10, and arranged the program for the second meeting of the Transylvania Teachers' Association for this year. Kendall and Mirick's "How to Teach the Fundamentals Subjects" was made the basis for the teachers' meeting this year, and it was decided by the committee, at the suggestion of the county superintendent, that stress should be laid on reading and spelling at the next meeting. The meeting will be held in Brevard Graded school building on Saturday, December 8.
