The War Thrift Campaign

The most popular campaign for funds needed in the prosecution of the war was recently launched by the Treasury Department of the Federal Government. It brings the question of financing the war right to the very doors of every family in the land and the country expects every man, woman and child to do "his bit." The plan proposed will not only yield a rich harvest of shooks for the government, it will, at the same time, inculcate the spirit of thrift and economy amongst the people. So ready was the response of the people in the campaign for the sale of Liberty Bonds, which are not issued in smaller denominations than fifty dollars, it is now proposed to place two billion dollars worth of War Savings Certificates in the hands of the people who may elect to pay in installments of twenty-five cents and five dollars, by the purchase of war thrift stamps.

The plan proposed will enable pretty much everybody to assist Uncle Sam in securing the shooks of war. Everybody, old and young, rich and poor, learned and illiterate, may join in the movement to place an additional \$2,000,000,000 in the vaults of the country's treasury for the prosecution of America's part in the war forced upon her by German atrocities. The War Thrift stamps are now available at postoffices, banks and from rural mail carriers in denominations of 25 cents and five dollars. In purchasing these the people are simply loaning their money to the government. In return they receive the amount invested with interest compounded. It takes just twenty-five cents to get in the game and four dollars to complete the payments on a five-dollar certificate payable January 1, 1923. These certificates are non-taxable the same as Liberty Bonds and just as attractive from the standpoint of investment.

On applying for one of these Thrift Stamps, of whatever denomination, the purchaser is given a certificate containing sixteen spaces. In each of these a stamp must be pasted before the card will be accepted in exchange for a genuine War Savings Certificate. The same principle is applicable in the handling of the five-dollar stamps, sixteen being required to entitle one to a certificate for \$100 at the end of five years. The four dollar card, if turned in during December or January, will buy a War Savings Certificate, if it shall be accompanied by twelve cents additional. And for each month during which delay in full payment shall be made one cent additional is reckoned in the calculation. For instance, the five-dollar certificate may be procured in January for \$4.12, in February for \$4.13, and so on through the year 1918, at the end of which period the campaign will be concluded. In brief, as some one has summarized, "It take a quarter to start being a United States bondholder; each quarter saved buys a thrift stamp; sixteen thrift stamps (worth \$4) plus twelve cents, buys a War Savings Certificate; the United States Government will pay you \$5 for each full War Savings Certificate; you get back your money invested in War Savings Certificates, with interest, at any time, by giving ten days notice at any postoffice." The plan is simple and the call to all.

These blank cards are issued for the benefit and convenience of those who may feel disposed to make small investments in their own interest and, at the same time, aid the government to accumulate sufficient funds for the support of its armies abroad. North Caro-

lina's prorata is \$13,530,000. Quite an enormous sum, but her people have never yet failed to do their full share in any great crisis. They will not fail in this one.

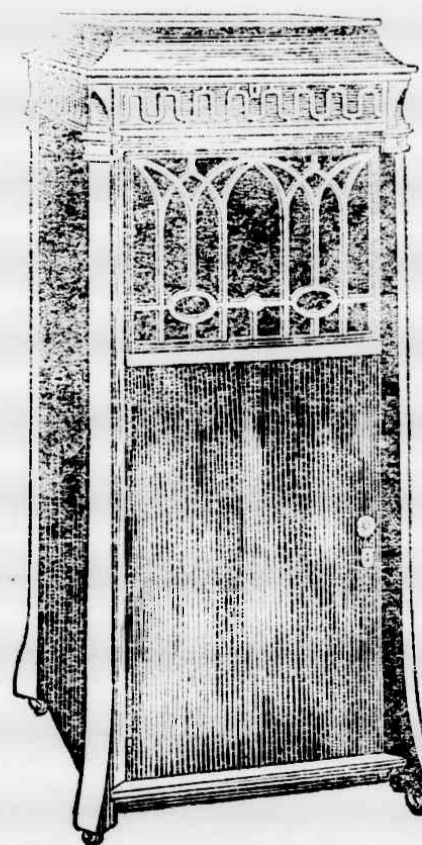
