FOOD ADMINISTRATION PREPARING TO PUT SCREWS ON UNSCRUPULOUS DEALERS

Rumblings of Impatience Being Heard Around Headquarters. Selfish and Unpatriotic Consumers Will be Dealt With Also—Fine of \$5,000 and Two Years' Imprisonment Penalty for Hoarding.—Administrator Henry A. Page Tightening the Reins.

Raleigh.—Notwithstanding its oft-repeated and proven assertions that its attitude toward all dealers in foodstuffs is first of all friendly, and that it is desirous of co-operating with all handlers of foodstuffs, rumblings of impatience at petty profiteering are beginning to be heard around the quarters of the Food Administration in this city.

That Food Administrator Henry A. Page has at heart the interests of the producers and handlers of foodstuffs has been demonstrated by his action in straightening out the wheat situation in the state and by his attitude toward all wholesalers and retailers in their respective conferences here; but Mr. Page is not famous either for his patience in the face of injury, nor for his forbearance when laws are being violated and people oppressed through the greed of grasping or unpatriotic dealers.

Offenders to be Put Out of Business.

Where wanton violations of the law and policy of the Food Administration are found, it is anticipated that the offending dealers will be punished by the simple procedure of putting them out of business. Where profiteers are shrewd enough to stay

practice, where it has been the custom for years, cannot be tolerated under present conditions.

Consumers of food commodities as well as dealers are subject to the provisions of the Food Control Law, section 6 of which provides that any necessity shall be deemed to be hoarded when held, contracted or arranged for, by any person in excess of his reasonable requirements for a reasonable time. The penalty for violation of this provision is a fine of \$5,000 or two years' imprisonment, or both, and in addition, the commodity hoarded is subject to confiscation.

Large Purchases Inexcusable.

State Food Administrator Henry A. Page points out that there is absolutely no excuse for purchasing foodstuffs in large quantities, because (1) prices have been stabilized and are no more apt to advance than they are to decline, and (2) the Food Administration's first concern is to supply our own people with foodstuffs and it will not permit the exportation of such an amount of any commodity as will endanger the supply necessary for home consumption.

The great injury that would be worked by this practice is clearly pointed out as follows:

(1) It would add to the burden of railroads, which are already strained to the breaking point.

(2) It would tend to advance prices and thereby work an injustice to all consumers of foodstuffs.

(3) It would deprive our own soldiers, the soldiers of our Allies, the civilian population of our Allies and hundreds of thousands of STARVING WOMEN AND CHILDREN in Europe, of foodstuffs which are needed not only to help win the war, but to save innocent people from actual and certain starvation.

In the face of these facts Food Administrator Page does not hesitate to publicly denounce any person who has any inclination toward hoarding selfish and unpatriotic to an extent which is approaching the treasonous. Mr. Page does not believe there will be any hoarding in North Carolina, and if there are those who are selfish, unpatriotic and foolish enough to attempt it they will be dealt with promptly and vigorously.

A father may smoke a pipe, but his character is formed; but a young man forget that his boys are still children, and much more subject to external influences than to the good influences of the home, in these modern days.

Twenty-one years ought to be the minimum age at which a youth might indulge in tobacco. Twenty-five years is young enough for most men to take the weed. Our laws are too lax in this respect. A boy is a boy until he has become a man in every sense of the word, and it is the disgrace of civilization that so many of our boys are physically, mentally and morally tainted before the age of manhood is attained.

It is clearly understood, we do not mean to state that a youth may not smoke and still preserve his moral character; but we merely speak from long practical experience when we see that it is a mighty difficult thing for a boy to resist so nowadays.

There is a service mothers may do for their growing boys. A mother's appeal will reach the heart and skull of any son. Let every mother exact from her boys a solemn pledge not to smoke until twenty-one, and those boys will be glad if when they are old enough to know enough to appreciate a good mother.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

Bad Teeth Indicted.

Is it true that bad teeth cause rheumatism? Should tonsils that get sore occasionally be removed?

Answer—Yes. Bad teeth cause many things including loss of sleep, beauty, disposition and money. According to dental experts, decayed teeth is a medium for infection of rheumatism and tuberculosis. Diseased tonsils should invariably be removed, especially if there is a family tendency to deafness, tuberculosis or rheumatism. But for an occasional enlargement with simple sore throat, resulting from careless personal hygiene and where the family history is good the advice of a good specialist should be sought before considering an operation for removal.

Find Out the Real Trouble.

For twenty years I have suffered from head catarrh. Can you tell me what to do for a relief?

Answer—You are probably good for at least twenty years more suffering, because head catarrh never kills, and the afflicted one is kept busy thinking (and talking) about it. According to the word catarrh means inflammation. What is commonly called "head catarrh" is either due to a deviated septum in the nose, inflammation of the nasal or frontal sinuses, or the Eustachian tubes. Or it may be simply hay fever, a disease due to the pollen from grain, weeds and flowers. The only way to try to discover the cause is to have it removed. If the trouble is in the nose, a surgical operation might be needed. Open air sleeping the year around and the avoidance of extremes of heat and cold, especially too hot steam railroad trains, will most certainly help. Plain food, plain dress, and total abstinence from alcohol and all beverages will also help a great deal.

Seaver, Physical Director at Yale, and various other authorities; and on the mental side by Dr. Bush, Professor of Physiology at Vermont, and numerous other students.

A youth, in reasonably good health, requires no stimulation, and he can ill endure the action of a narcotic several times a day. To the narcotic influence of tobacco may be assigned, we think, the well grounded prejudice against the cigarette, in popular opinion. This is not the observation of a theorist or a moralist, mind you; it is the belief of the experienced physician.
