"PLATTSBURGS" FOR SCHOOL TEACHERS

To Be Held by National Security League Throughout Country During Coming Summer.

"Teachers' Plattsburgs" at which 200,000 public school teachers will be given practical training in patriotic education...

The objects of the League's campaign are two-fold--active combating of German propaganda and awakening a more responsible American citizenship.

At Summer Schools. The Security League will conduct these "Teachers' Plattsburgs" through the medium of the summer schools for teachers that are held throughout the country every year.

The training camps will be conducted by leading educators whose cooperation will be enlisted by the League. The actual instruction will be under the direction of Dr. Robert M. McHenry, educational director of the League...

War Spirit.

The teachers will be given a series of vital interpretations of the war by men and women who have given careful study to the situation. In addition to this instilling of the war spirit in the teachers, the training camps will also afford them practical instruction in the best methods of imparting to the youth of the land the two war principles...

A preliminary letter has been sent by Doctor McHenry to the directors of all the summer schools of the country.

TO THOSE WHO FAIL TO GRASP WAR'S MEANING

There are doubtless some who do not understand what this struggle really is. Some who were born here resent interference with their comfort and prosperity...

There are some born abroad who have come to this land for a greater freedom and broader opportunities and have sought and received the privileges of American citizenship...

This is the oath that the applicant for citizenship makes: That he will support the Constitution of the United States and that he absolutely and entirely renounces all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate or sovereignty...

"False to Their Oaths." All these naturalized citizens who are taking part in education to our Government in the conduct of the war are false to their oaths, are forfeiting their rights of citizenship, are repudiating their honorable obligations...

This is a war of defense. It is perfectly described in the words of the Constitution which established this nation: "To provide for the common defense" and "To secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity."

By entering this war the United States availed itself of the very last opportunity to defend itself.

Marcel is a man. He is just fifteen years old, but yet he is a man. Early he is a man because in the last four years' time has burned into his child heart marks that should wait for sterner maturity...

The boy, who was now a man, worked hard, yes, no more. With his bare hands and his boy's strength he fought almost alone the unequal fight against want with what little help his frail mother could give.

Mother Can Keep Children. One of the 70 or 80 local societies in France, handicapped by lack of funds because deluged by calls for help, tried to relieve the family by taking away the children...

And then when everything seemed lost and despair came they heard the news: "No, it could not be true. They would help them with food and clothing? They would till the soil? Mend the barns and stay near by to see that things went well?"

That was two years ago. Today this family is self supporting and has some to spare for the more needy ones, who still are being helped. Little Jean is taller. He looks well fed--and he is well fed. The baby is so roly poly that the dimples have come again.

GERMANY'S GUILT ESTABLISHED.

Extracts from Prince Karl Lichnowsky's "My London Mission, 1912-1914" a copy of which has just reached this country. Prince Lichnowsky, who was German Ambassador to England when the war broke out, says that he wrote the document for his family archives, but it was made public in Germany and created a great stir...

"On Aug. 2 (1914), when I saw Asquith in order to make a final attempt, he was completely broken, and, although quite calm, tears ran down his face."

"Of course it would only have needed a hint from Berlin to make Count T. Reihold (Austrian Foreign Minister in America, 1914) satisfy himself with a diplomatic success and put up with the Serbian reply."

"The impression became ever stronger that we (Germany) desired war in all circumstances."

"Thus ended my London mission. It was wrecked not by the policy of the British, but by the policy of our policy."

"I had to say in my London a policy which I knew to be fallacious. I was punished for it, for it was a sin against the Holy Ghost."
