YOUR HEALTH

Why quarantine against infectious and contagious diseases? Great as the advances in medicine and surgery are, wonderful as the results already attained in controlling human suffering the day has not yet dawned upon a world free from diseases or the means of controlling successfully with each and every human ailment. So far as I am aware physicians have but one specific diphtheria antitoxin a remedy which cures in 99 per cent of cases if used in time after the disease is manifested. The time is far distant when every disease can be coped with as can diphtheria. In the bill of preventive medications we have vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever. Vaccination against smallpox has practically eliminated that disease so completely that there is now a large following whose business appears to be a persistent effort to deny its value. The records of every army in the world bear witness to the value of typhoid vaccination also worth of tetanus antitoxin as a protection against tetanus. Seeing how little has been accomplished as to positive cure and prevention of diseases it is incumbent upon every one to co-operate with health authorities in an effort to control disease.

During the period of Napoleon's day of power it was said that a marshalls baton might lie in the knapsack of any French soldier. Today it is possible that something of great value from a medical standpoint is latent in the brain of any boy or girl.

It is true that a quarantine while in force works some hardship upon any family but the time designated in each case has been determined by men who are the best qualified to decide such matters and are not arbitrary decision. Then too, take the case of our schools.
