HOW TO MAKE A HOT BED

If you have no hot bed in your garden you are missing not only a large amount of pleasure, but a very material help. With a hot bed you can have an earlier, better and more economical garden. A hot bed will give you early vegetables such as lettuce, spinach, onions and radishes, before the time you can safely sow seed out of doors. It also gives you the opportunity to raise your own tomato, cauliflower, cabbage, pepper and egg plants instead of paying a high price at the nursery; you may also start your flower plants such as salvia in the hot bed and thus get an earlier and longer blooming season.

There is nothing difficult about making a hotbed, yet how few of us take the trouble! A few old boards, a glass sash, a pair of hinges and a plentiful supply of fresh horse manure are all you require. Of course a regular 3x6 hotbed is better but any window of any size will do. Be sure and place your hotbed on the south side of a building if you can; but any sunny spot will do. Dig a pit three feet deep of size to fit your sash, fill it to within three inches of the top with fresh horse manure. No other fertilizer will answer the purpose and it must be fresh—not over four weeks old and fresher if possible. It is the heat generated by this manure that we depend on for the quick germination and growth of the young plants. Build a frame of boards around the pit; you can nail the boards to corner posts or make a removable frame. If you have a regular 3x6 hotbed sash, make your frame three feet high at back and two feet high at front; thus giving one foot fall the long way of the bed. This slope sheds the rain and admits the sunshine to all parts of the bed. On top of the manure which should be well trampled down put six inches of good rich garden soil and rake it level. Bank the dirt

you took out of the pit around the boards forming the sides, sloping it up to the top. See that your sash fits tightly on the under side so that cold air cannot get in on frosty nights.

Place strong hinges at the back so that the sash may easily be raised and lowered conveniently. Fasten lower edge of sash with hook and eye and leave hot bed to "burn out" for two days. Then sow your seed thinly in rows two inches apart to the depth of twice the size of the seed, covering them firmly with soil and mark the end of the row with seed packet stuck on a stick. Water the bed evenly with a water can having a spray nozzle; fasten your sash down tightly and in two weeks your plants will begin to show above the soil. On sunny days give the plants air or they will grow spindly. Just a little air at first and leave the sash propped up say three inches for an hour during the heat of the day gradually increasing the distance and time of exposure until you can have the sash entirely open on warm days. Don't forget to close the sash at night until all danger of frost is past.

Water your plants when the soil seems dry with a watering can having a fine spray and keep the weeds pulled out. You can start your patty pan and crook neck squash in tomato cans which have had the ends melted out and the joints if unsoldered tied up with a string and thus get them several weeks earlier. You may have your tomato and pepper plants in small tin pots and set them out without even wilting. Start a hot bed this year.
