JAP-CALIFORNIA LAND MATTER UP

FIRST STATEMENT ON MOOTED QUESTION IS GIVEN OUT BY SECRETARY COLBY.

ISSUED BY CONSENT OF JAPS

Outcome of The Movement to Re-Cast Land Laws of California Must be Acceptable to Country at Large.

Washington.—The State Department declared in a formal statement that no outcome of the movement in California to re-cast the state laws affecting alien land tenure "will be acceptable to the country at large that does not accord with existing and applicable provisions of law and, what is equally important, with the national instinct of justice."

The statement was the first issued on the California land question, which long has been a matter of conversation between the department and the Japanese ambassador to Washington. The fact that it was issued on the eve of the election in California at which the proposed new state law is to be voted upon was declared by State Department officials to have no political significance.

The impression was given that the chief purpose was to convey an assurance to the people of Japan that the American government would see to it that their legitimate interests would be safeguarded and would continue to have the consideration to which they were entitled. The department's statement was made public in agreement with the Japanese government.

Mexico Settles Claim. Washington.—Great Britain has agreed to a settlement of the claim against Mexico growing out of the killing of William S. Benton, a British subject, near Juarez, on February 17, 1914. Mexico is to pay \$10,000 cash to Mrs. Benton and a pension of \$250 a day as long as Mrs. Benton remains unmarried.
