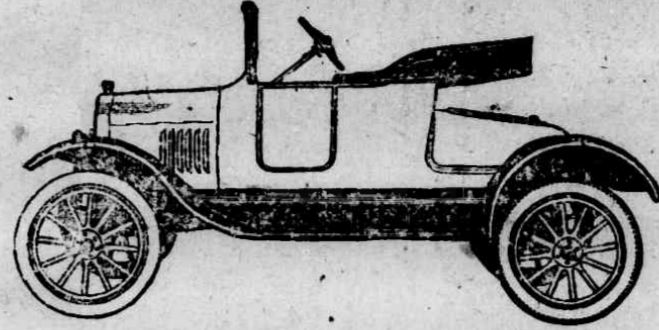
Mr. H. P. Sitton of Pendleton, S. C., is at his summer home in this community and we extend him our hearty welcome.
