GREENVILLE WAKES TO ADVANTAGE OF **JONES GAP ROAD**

Dr. Hunt Meets With Greenville Citizens and Urges Importance of Highway to People of Both Counties.

MASS MEETING IS CALLED TO BRING ON IMMEDIATE ACTION.

Dr. C. W. Hunt returned Saturday evening from Greenville, S. C., where he went to solicit the interest and support of several of the leading citizens for the purpose of discussing the possibilities of Greenville County immediately taking action toward the building of the Jones Gap Highway from Greenville to the North Carolina State line.

TELLS OF ADVANTAGES: Delay in improvement of the Jones Gap road is causing Greenville to lose the trade of two North Carolina counties that formerly carried on most of their commerce with Green-
