

SLAYS BURGLAR WITH HIS HANDS

Amateur Champion of Pacific Coast Kills Thief With Full Nelson Hold.

FOUND THIEF IN HOME

Wrestler Heartbroken When He Discovers That Burglar Is Dead—Just Wanted to Detain Him While Wife Called Police.

San Francisco.—Louis H. Ardouin of the Olympic club, who recently won the amateur heavyweight wrestling championship of the Pacific coast, killed with his bare hands a man he found rifling a bureau drawer in his home. The man later was identified as William E. Anderson. He leaves a widow residing here.

Ardouin told the police that after grappling with Anderson, who was unarmed, for five minutes he applied a severe wrestling hold to detain him until Mrs. Ardouin could telephone for help.

No Charge Is Likely.

No charge is likely ever to be placed against Ardouin for the slaying, police said.

Examination of Anderson's body disclosed that death apparently was caused by strangulation, Ardouin having doubled his neck forward so that his throat had been pressed against the collar of a khaki shirt he wore.

Ardouin was heartbroken when he discovered that Anderson was dead.

Will Help Victim's Wife.

"I'll do anything in my power for his wife," he said. "All I tried to do was to subdue him. He put up a terrible battle, even after I had got a full-Nelson hold on him. I was horribly shocked when the policemen turned him over and found him dead. I did not mean to kill him, although I put all the pressure I could."

Ardouin has participated in a number of California wrestling tournaments and has wrestled informally

with Ed (Stranger) Lewis, Harin, Plestina and other widely known professionals. He is said to have forced some of these to extend themselves to throw him. During the war Ardouin was engaged in athletic instruction work under the Young Men's Christian association and was stationed at the Presidio of San Francisco.

ers of the Southland and he heard a voice calling to him, "little boy please wait." There she was walking with all the dignity and grace as only our Southern Queens possessed. The boy stood rooted to the spot, doffing his cap and holding it and the paper behind him; he stood with open mouth. When she came to him, she said, "please let me see that paper," there was a smile on her face for she had heard her old family servant try to shield her from the bad news and she knew the great love he had for her household. Taking the paper she slowly unfolded it and read. When she came to the fatal line, it seemed to the boy that she made a movement, closed her eyes, and he saw her lips move, and he heard a low "God's Will Be Done". And folding the paper she handed it back, and stooping kissed the boy on the forehead, and said "God Bless You My son". She was a widow, and her only son had made the supreme sacrifice.

It was but natural in those days that the boys' games should be playing soldier. The boy had his Headquarters under a large oak tree. The boy sentinels were posted two and two down the different streets. Near by and at the corner were two horse-

men, Confederates home on sick furloughs. No, the Hun never got his bags again, for when the boys opened them, they found a feast of things not seen by them for years, yum, yum, didn't they look good and taste better. An Edam cheese, several bolognas, true and pure coffee, and a lot of other things.
