ARMISTICE DAY:

As reported elsewhere in the columns of this paper the 'Armistice Day' celebration on Friday, November 11th, has at last assumed definite proportions. The enthusiasm and liberality of the business men is making possible the Barbecue deserve special mention. The program as now proposed will prove rather expensive, but as one of our leading business men said, "If we are to be host to the country people, we should not only give them something to eat but should provide a feed that will meet with the hearty approval of all who come". Yes, it will cost a neat little sum of money but the "News" believes it will prove a wise investment. Furthermore it is the first time in quite awhile that Brevard has planned a big day and we can well afford the price in view of the fact that we permitted to pass almost unnoticed the 4th of July, Home Coming Day and our Annual County Fair. Remember, Mr. Citizen, that this is your celebration; that the County people have been invited as your guests; that it will take money to feed and entertain them; when the Finance Committee calls on you for your donation, give him the cordial greeting, which is justly his due, and send him away with a handsome contribution.

BREVARD AND THE HARD SURFACED ROAD:

In the last several issues of this paper there has appeared news items as to the progress of the hard surface roads being constructed from the Henderson County line to Brevard. The Asheville Construction Company which has the contract, stated thru their official representative, Mr. Clyde Reed, that it would finish this road as per the time limit contained in the contract. This was something like ten months from the time they first started, which would mean that the road will be built to the city limit in the next six months.

From the city limit to the end of our present paved street, the city will be expected to pave this part. Is it not about time that this important matter should be given consideration by our city Fathers? There is certainly nothing else to be done but to pave our street to the city limit and connect with this fine hard surface road before the tourist season starts next year. Now is the time to start agitating, while labor is plentiful and cheap. Why not have the present road builders, the Asheville Construction Company, make a bid on this work. As they are already there and have their plant and equipment on the ground, they would be in a position to hard surface this road much more reasonably than some other paving company that would have to come in and set up a plant. Now is the time to act.

CITIZENSHIP:

Citizenship in a country like ours is the channel through which we work out the problems of Government; the means by which we give expression to the kind of Government we desire to control. We should be the better and more informed the citizenry the stronger and more beneficial will be the laws worked out through the Government by those chosen to represent us. And as we only arrive at the truth by considerate discussion, where ideas and propositions are exchanged in an effort

of mutual helpfulness, it necessarily follows that from firm, well considered independent thinking the best and most useful results will follow. Citizenship has its responsibilities as well as its benefits. Every citizen owes the absolute duty of contributing his best and untiring efforts in making his Government the highest type of efficient service, and at all times responsive to the highest ideals of civic righteousness and the creation of just laws. Likewise he also owes an unfaltering allegiance to the Government he has thus helped to form. No citizen can violate a law of his country without doing violence to his obligation as a citizen and therefore it is very necessary for citizens to see that evil laws are repealed and good ones enacted, so that the highest type of Government may at all times be maintained. This is a first duty of citizenship and in order to accomplish this duty the women will find out they can not be strictly loyal to their party in casting their ballot loyally but should be non-partisan and unless we do cast our ballot in such manner I frankly say we place party obligations above our duty. I feel it my duty to use my ballot for the best moral and most capital man regardless of party. If we do this the women will abolish to a great degree the corrupt morals in the two great parties.

I wish to be understood as believing organization of the two parties for if we destroy their efficiency, by followers breaking factions then a death blow would be dealt to popular Government.

This does not mean a blind following of party whether right or wrong, but to consider with sound reasoning and if wrong and corrupt which ever party is may be should be disciplined to the point of defeat.

Outside of this method I see no chance for the women to lift the standard of the two great parties to an elevated platform.
