Sealed proposals will be received until 3 o'clock P. M., October 16, 1922, by the Board of Aldermen in care of the undersigned, for the purchase of all the above bonds, dated September 1, 1922, denomination \$500 maturing in installments on September 1 annually in numerical order, lowest numbers first, \$1,000 1924 and 1928 \$2,000 1929 and 1938 and \$2,500 1939 to 1948 all inclusive, without option of prior payment. These bonds are to be prepared under the supervision of the United States Mortgage and Trust Company, New York City, which will certify as to the genuineness of the signatures of the officials and the seal impressed thereon. Legality will be approved by Chester B. Masulich, Esq., whose approving opinion will be furnished to the purchaser with charge.

Purpose of issue: \$20,000 for extending existing water works system and \$30,000 to pay debt incurred for street paving, including a part of the cost of the fire engine.

All bonds are direct and general obligations of the town of Brevard, and a sufficient tax without limit has been provided by law and ordinance. Proposals must be on forms (to be furnished by undersigned or said trust company) and to be inclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposals for Bonds" and addressed to the undersigned Clerk and must be accompanied by one thousand dollars cash or certified check for a like amount, payable to the order of the Town Treasurer and drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company, to secure the town against any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid.

Bonds will be delivered on or about November 6, 1922, in New York City, or, at purchaser's cost, including exchange, elsewhere. No bid of less than par and accrued interest will be considered. The right to reject all bids is reserved.

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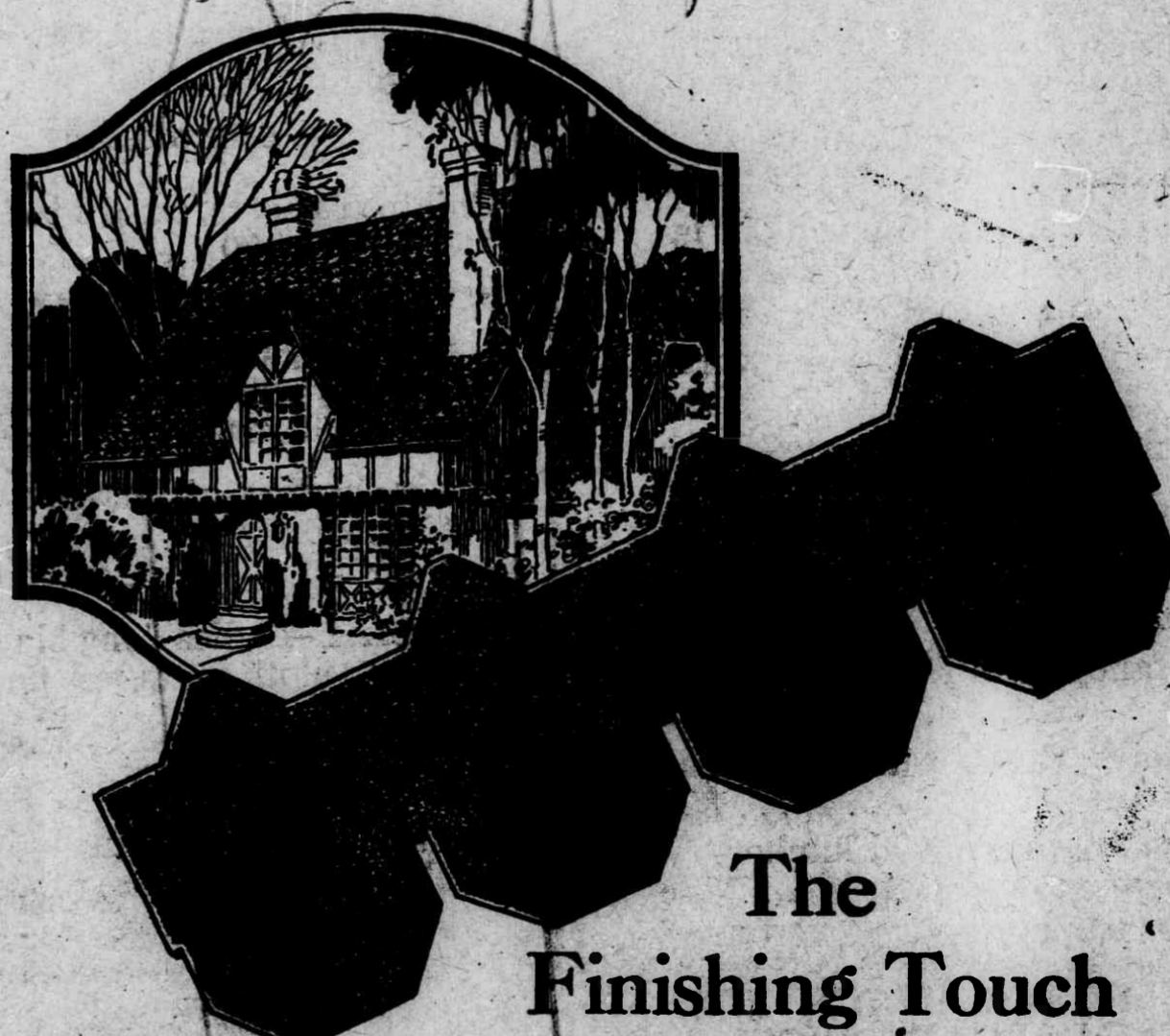
