

The Katherine Blueberry, a Department of Agriculture Selected Hybrid. With Berries Three-Quarters of an Inch in Diameter.



The Ordinary Wild Elucoerty.



The illustration is used in such a way as to lead the pender to believe that this firm has for sale blueherries of the kind shown in the illustration, when as a matter of thet ordinary wild blueberries, first transplanting to a nursery, are furmished in response to the advertise-ment. Furthermore, advertisements issued by this firm give very misleading information. One of their advertisements, in the February number of ; 2 well-known garden magazine, states that 'by repeated transplanting, we priceted the root system of the ants", that "now, you may grow blueberries as easily as any other garden berries"; and that "starting with our narsery-grown plants assures success under all conditions." These statements give a very erroneous and mislending idea of the conditions necessary for success in blueberry cul-

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
