We hope that our people will get busy and provide the necessary funds to do the grading and planting and make this a beauty spot of which we will all be proud.

The new post cards gotten out by our enterprising druggists, showing views of the monument and scenes in the Pisgah Forest, should be sent freely all over the country by our citizens.

Thank you very much for your sample of the post cards showing Pisgah National Forest. There is no question but what they will do a great deal to advertise Pisgah National Forest.

It is our intention to use the Memorial Arch in our photographic work whenever an official photographer comes down here again. Unfortunately this memorial was not completed when Mr. Shipp was here over a year ago and we could not get an official photograph of it.

In this connection I had been wondering if the Memorial Committee had in mind doing any landscape work around the Memorial Arch. It certainly needs some sort of landscaping in order to properly set it off. If we can help you in any way in getting the necessary shrubbery and trees we will be more than glad to do it. We have some fine spruce trees ranging from 12 to 20 feet high growing in the Pink Beds and any number of these could be used around the entrance, provided this would help in giving the correct landscape feature.
