HEAVY BURDEN ON PEOPLE In past nine years, more than 100,000 permanent federal officials have been added to the rolls—increasing cost \$195,591,000. State official payrolls have been increased in numbers and cost so that altogether one out of every twelve workers is a government employee. Additional laws enacted by Congress and State legislatures all increase taxes and take money away from the producing citizen. It has been the slogan of the last two presidents that government pay rolls must be cut down in numbers. Pennsylvania, Illinois, Washington and Idaho have consolidated boards and commissions and materially cut their overhead. Every state in the union and every department of the federal government could probably trim at least 25 per cent off its overhead. Why not do it?
