CAESAR'S HEAD DEVELOPMENT

The people of Transylvania have not realized, as yet, the great benefit they are going to derive from the building of the Geer Highway from Greenville via Caesar's Head to Brevard.

We have been over many scenic roads in North Carolina, Virginia and in the Adirondaks, Green Mountain and the Berkshire Hills of New York and New England, and we feel safe in saying that the scenery on the road from Greenville to Brevard is not only equal, but is superior to that which can be seen on any road east of the Rockies for sublime grandeur and enchanting beauty.

The entire range of nature's choicest views are offered to the traveler on this highway, for you can pass through the cotton fields of North Carolina along the placid waters of the Saluda River and its tributaries and then strike the foothills of the Blue Ridge and over a splendid highway, broad, smooth, safe and no sharp curves, one ascends to the Great Divide and in passing there is a constant and ever changing vista offered of foothills, rippling ridges, deepcut coves, mountain torrents in an endless series of cascades on their way from the lofty plateau to the level plains below, and then the mighty and majestic mountains from whose summit one can gaze in awe and admiration into and over Georgia, South Carolina, and a part of North Carolina and even farther one may see a view of the sky piercing peaks of the great Smoky Mountains in Tennessee. We pass the mighty and awe inspiring mass of precipitous stone called Table Rock, which mountain has no equal in South Carolina, and finally we reach Caesar's Head and from that grand precipice, we get a panorama unequalled. From thence we pass on through the beautiful valley of Little River known as the Cedar Rock and Buck Forest section, which with Caesar's Head has been famous and popular with South Carolinians for many generations past.

And then we go on down and by a splendid highway, descend into the fertile valley of the French Broad and pass by Conestee Falls, Bridal Veil, Glen Cannon and other Cascades worthy of a special trip to see them along, and then if one is not satisfied, there is still yet the wonderful trip through our great National Park, Pisgah Forest, and up Pisgah Mountain on to Asheville.

By this new road, it is an easy two hours drive from Brevard to Greenville and the good people of South Carolina have seemingly attempted to hard-surface this wonderful road which leads to "South Carolina's own land of the Sky."

So much for the tourist side of this wonderful road.

Let us now look to the financial side and see how Transylvania is benefitted.

We people here in the mountains have been blessed by Nature and by Nature's God, with a climate unsurpassed and unequalled and by a soil peculiarly adapted to the raising of certain fruits and vegetables which the people of upper South Carolina need and demand and we specially refer to apples, cabbages and Irish potatoes.

This new road now offers to the farmers of Transylvania County a short and easy haul which they can make by truck or even by horse and wagon, so that they can leave their homes in the morning dispose of their load by noon and return home by night, and sell their produce at a higher price because it is fresh and

not bruised and battered, wilted and worn.

Transylvania County should be the late garden for Greenville, Pickens, and Anderson Counties. Our road Commissioners have seen the wisdom of improving the Transylvania end of this great South Carolina highway known as the Geer Highway, and have been able to secure the aid of the State Highway Commission and are working in concert with them and cutting out the sharp curves and steep grades on Mill Hill mountain.

One of the big business men of South Carolina and a man of broad mind and far-seeing business vision as well as one who gives largely to charity and public benefactions, has made large donations out of his private means to the building of this road on the South Carolina side and we refer to Mr. Ben E. Geer of Greenville, and the people of his native State have named this road after him and we people of Transylvania County should appreciate the wonderful assistance that Mr. Geer has done in securing the building of the road to the Transylvania line via Caesar's Head and we feel that he should be hailed as one of the great benefactors of Transylvania County.

We advise everyone who can to make the trip from Brevard to Greenville over the Geer Highway by Caesar's Head and we will promise them that they will be amply repaid.
