KIND WORDS FROM GREENVILLE

The true friendliness and desire on the part of Greenville and Asheville to help Brevard is here illustrated by the editorial appearing in The Greenville News and Asheville Citizen.

Brevard is indeed fortunate in being geographically situated on a straight line between these two splendid cities and still more fortunate in enjoying the friendship and support of two of the best, most progressive and more prosperous cities of the Carolinas.

These editorials are the public utterances of the press of the two cities and in addition, many citizens of Brevard have received personal letters from prominent men of both Asheville and Greenville, which even more fully set forth the interest felt by the citizens of said cities in Brevard and Transylvania County.

It is both the pleasure and the duty of the citizens of our Town and County to show their appreciation of the interest taken in us by these two powerful communities by extending to them every courtesy and every aid within our power.

And we wish to say to the good people of both cities, that their friendship and helpful co-operation is fully appreciated, by the citizens of Transylvania County, and that we will go our full length and do all possible to aid in creating and maintaining a stronger, better and closer intimacy and interest between the three sections, and we know that it will be of advantage to all of us from every view point. What Transylvania County lacks in the quantity of her ability, we want Asheville and Greenville to know that we will make up in the quality thereof.

We copy below an editorial of The Greenville News of Jan. 9th, which speaks for itself:

OUR FRIENDS OF BREVARD

"Greenville people will deeply appreciate the spirit that prompts the co-operation of the two towns from Asheville and Greenville. It is a complimentary thing he says about the folks of this community.

"All this talk about Greenville trying to 'alienate the affections' of the Brevard section from Asheville is rather ridiculous, anyway. Perhaps it was put out in a semi-serious spirit in Asheville, principally for home consumption with the idea of arousing among Asheville citizens a greater realization of their opportunity to build stronger and more permanent friendships among neighboring counties. Be that as it may, Greenville is—or should be—out to make all the friends, she can, anywhere and everywhere, and we are certainly not going to stop trying to be better and better friends with the folks of Brevard just because a State line happens to run between us.

With the completion of the Greer highway, Brevard becomes really a next-door neighbor of Greenville, and this closer communication is the realization of a dream of many years of the people of the two counties. Now that we have the road we ought to redouble our efforts to increase

and stimulate social and commercial relations between the sections. Why not a joint picnic or some similar event during this spring or summer at some convenient point on this new highway.

"We can't have too many good friends among the people in our neighboring counties in North Carolina. There is no good reason why there shouldn't be a great deal more intercommunication and personal relations of all kinds among the people of Greenville, Pickens, Transylvania, Henderson and Buncombe Counties. Our road connections between these sections are being improved each year and the barriers of easy travel are rapidly being eliminated. Greenville people should constantly and consistently try to make this city a more attractive community from every standpoint, in amusements, recreational opportunities and as a commercial and shopping center, and we should go even further and take the initiative in heralding among all our neighbors our sincere desire to be friends with them and to offer them at all times the hospitality of our city in its deepest and sincerest form. Greenville pleads guilty to a deep and abiding friendship for the people of Brevard and Transylvania County and we are more than delighted to learn through Mr. Bell's letter that a reciprocal spirit exists in that section."

The Asheville Citizen has the following fine editorial which evinces the friendly interest Asheville has in our welfare:

BREVARD'S MAIL SERVICE

Something should be done to provide the people of Brevard with better mail service. The Transylvania capital is a thriving community in the center of territory that is being rapidly developed agriculturally, industrially and otherwise. The present postal service, of one mail a day, delivered by the one train a day operated from Asheville and Hendersonville, is an unjust handicap on the business and social life of the people of Transylvania County.

With the consent of the Corporation Commission, the Southern Railway cut off one of the trains to Brevard, the Southern alleging that it could operate no more than one train daily without a loss of money that it should not be asked to meet. On the merits of that contention The Citizen has no information enabling it to pass judgement; and it is properly a matter for the determination of the Corporation Commissioners after hearing the evidence on both sides.

But, granting that busses, automobiles and one train now provide Brevard with adequate accommodations for the transportation of passengers (which may or may not be true), it is still in order to inquire whether the Postoffice Department should not establish a star mail route between Brevard and Hendersonville, or Brevard and Asheville.

No doubt this proposal has already been discussed by the citizens of Brevard and the postal officials; but, unless the Postoffice heads in Washington are willing to condemn Brevard to a mail service poorer than that of thirty years ago, as Brevard asserts, then public opinion in Asheville and Brevard should be strong enough to bring about the operation of the star route.

"If they have not already done so, it would be a fine thing if some of Asheville's civic organizations should offer their services to Brevard in pressing their claim upon the attention of the Postoffice Department or upon the Corporation Commission. Brevard and Asheville are bound together by many ties. Aside from friendship, any conditions that hamper the growth of either town are injurious to the other. It should never be too late to do well. If Asheville has been slow in offering its assistance to the sister community in an undertaking that means much to Transylvania, Buncombe and the new year is the old for a good resolution backed by prompt action.

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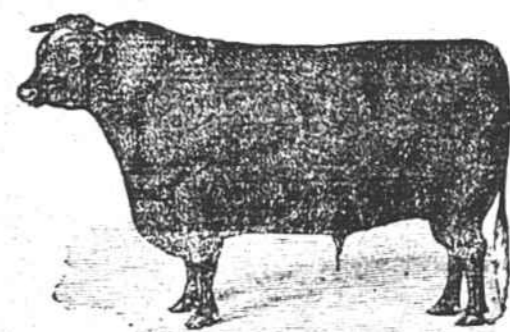
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
