BOX SUPPER AT CONNESSEE

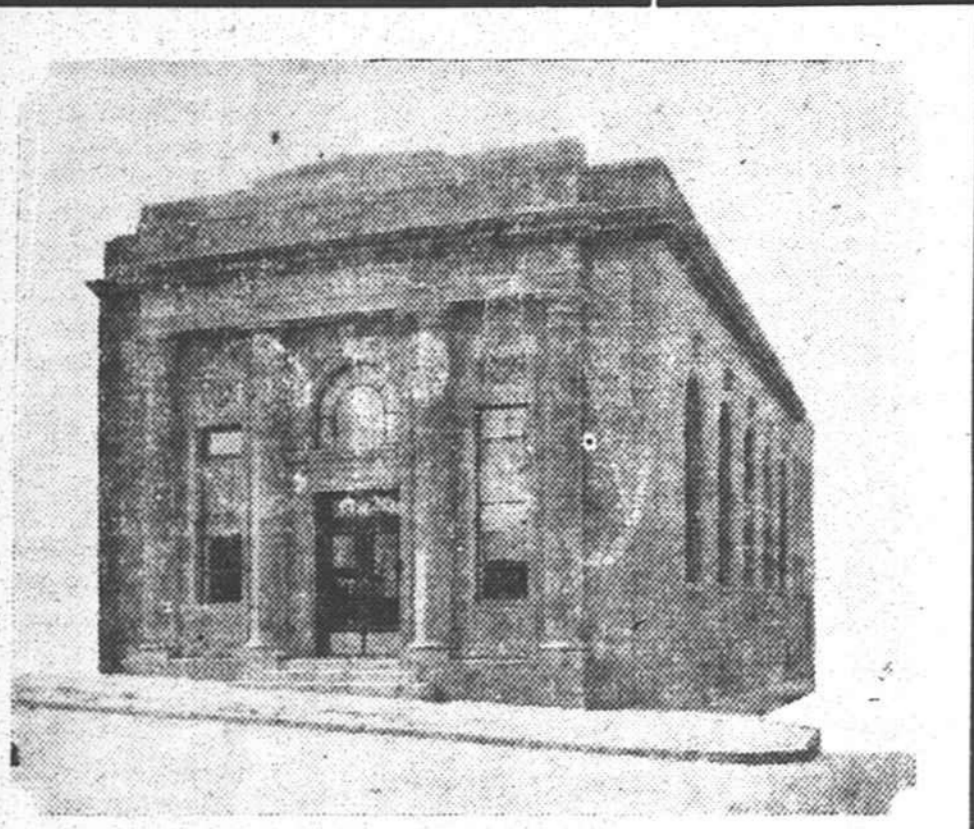
There will be a box supper at Connessee School House, Friday evening, June 26, at 7:30 o'clock.
