CAPTAIN REID ELKINS TO SPEAK ON DEFENSE TEST DAY, JULY 4TH

Every veteran of the World War, and every other ex-service man in Transylvania County, is urged to be present at the July Fourth celebration on the public recreation ground corner of Broad and Jordan streets, beginning at one o'clock, p.m.

Captain Reid Elkins, of Greenville, S. C., will make the principal talk on this occasion. Captain Elkins, who is a member of the 327th Infantry Regiment, Organized Reserves, 82nd Division, U. S. Army, will describe the National Defense Act, and the real meaning of Defense Test Day. The Fourth of July has been set aside by President Coolidge and Governor McLean as National Defense Test Day, and every able-bodied citizen is urged to show his interest by being present in order to be counted in the number of those who observe the day.

LIBERTY SAFEGUARDED CONSTITUTION

During the hysteria produced by the political campaign, the people of Oregon two years ago voted in favor of a law prohibiting parents from sending children to any but public schools. Private schools were entirely eliminated by the measure. The United States Supreme Court has annulled that law as contrary to every principle of constitutional liberty.

There are many reasons why parents may not want to send their children to public schools. The decision does not affect the power of the state to enforce proper schooling. The state may insist that the academic standards of private schools be as high as those for public schools. It may license teachers and supervise all schools to assure the maintenance of standards. But it interferes with special instruction of the normal or cultural nature.

The decision illustrates how the United States constitution and the United States Supreme Court guarantee and protect the rights of American citizen. Hasty legislative action or haphazard decisions at general elections cannot override the ultimate protection afforded every citizen by the two great institutions of American liberty.

SALVAGE VALUE OF OLD ROADS

A recent report on salvage value of old roads, prepared from the records of the New York State Highway Department, shows the average cost per mile of reconstruction, completed contracts 1919 to 1924 inclusive, \$36,000 for first class Portland cement concrete, and for asphalt macadam for same period, \$16,000. This recon-

The \$20,600 difference in reconstruction cost measures the value of the savings possibilities of the previous work in connection with the spindly macadam types. The 1925 figures show about \$21,960 per mile difference in such work. Massachusetts reports \$15,000 and Connecticut, \$20,500 difference in favor of the macadam. These figures are of interest to all States, for highway maintenance and reconstruction becomes increasingly more important to taxpayers as the mileage of hard surfaced highways increases.
