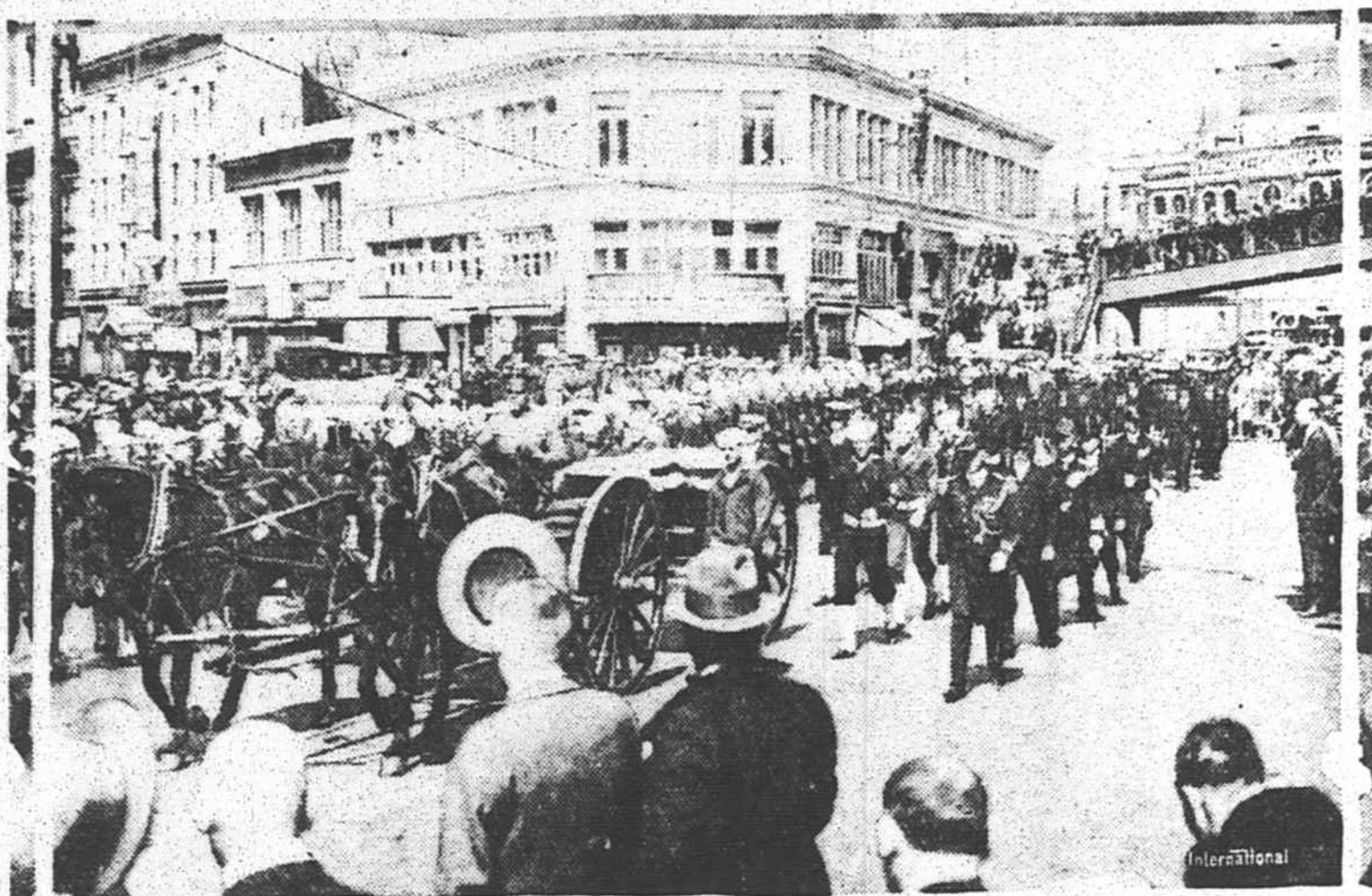
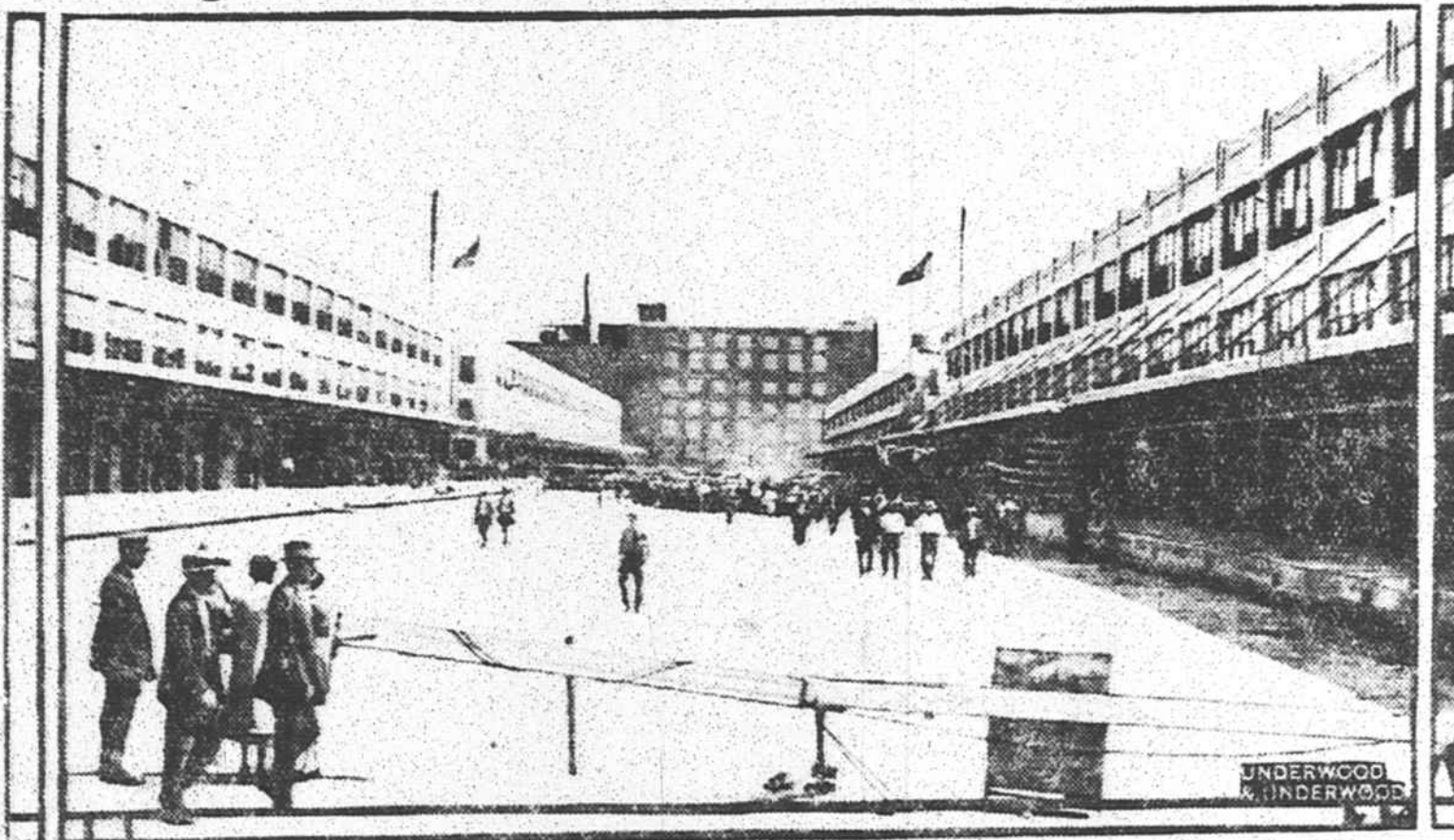


Ambassador Bancroft's Body Brought Home

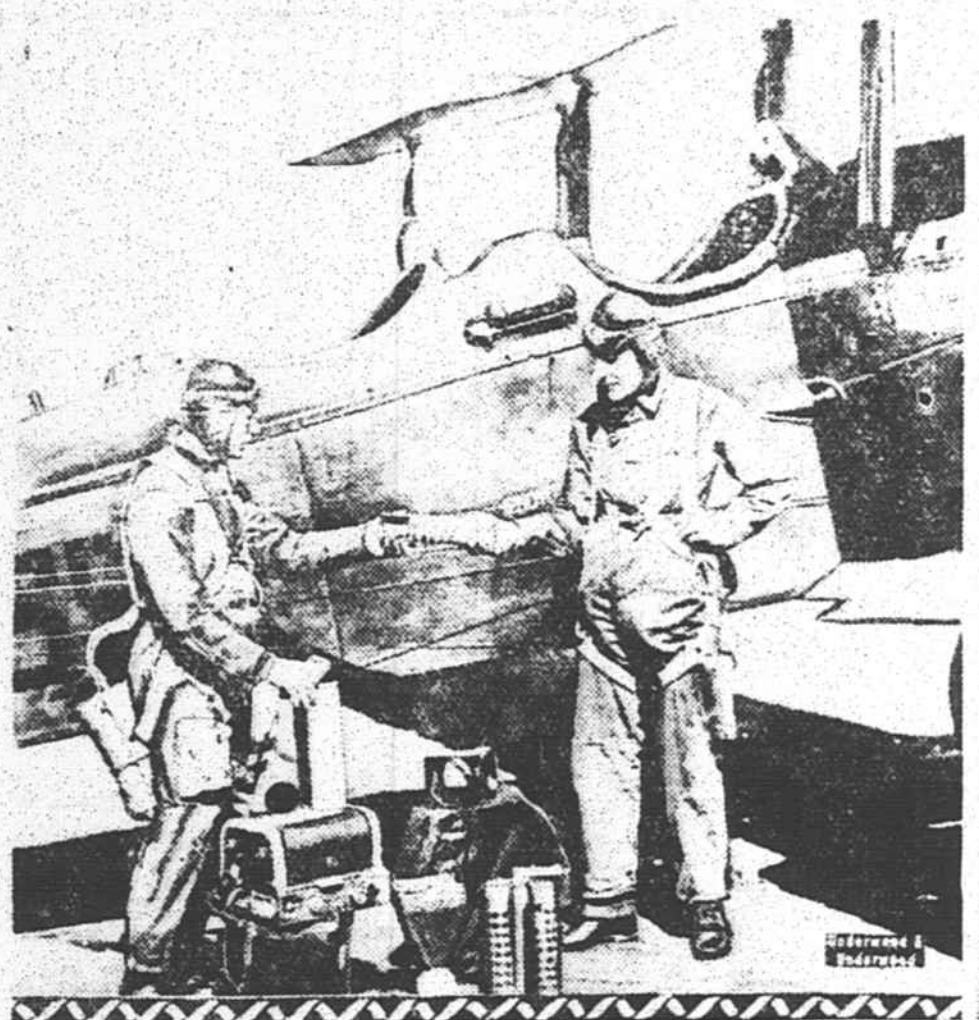

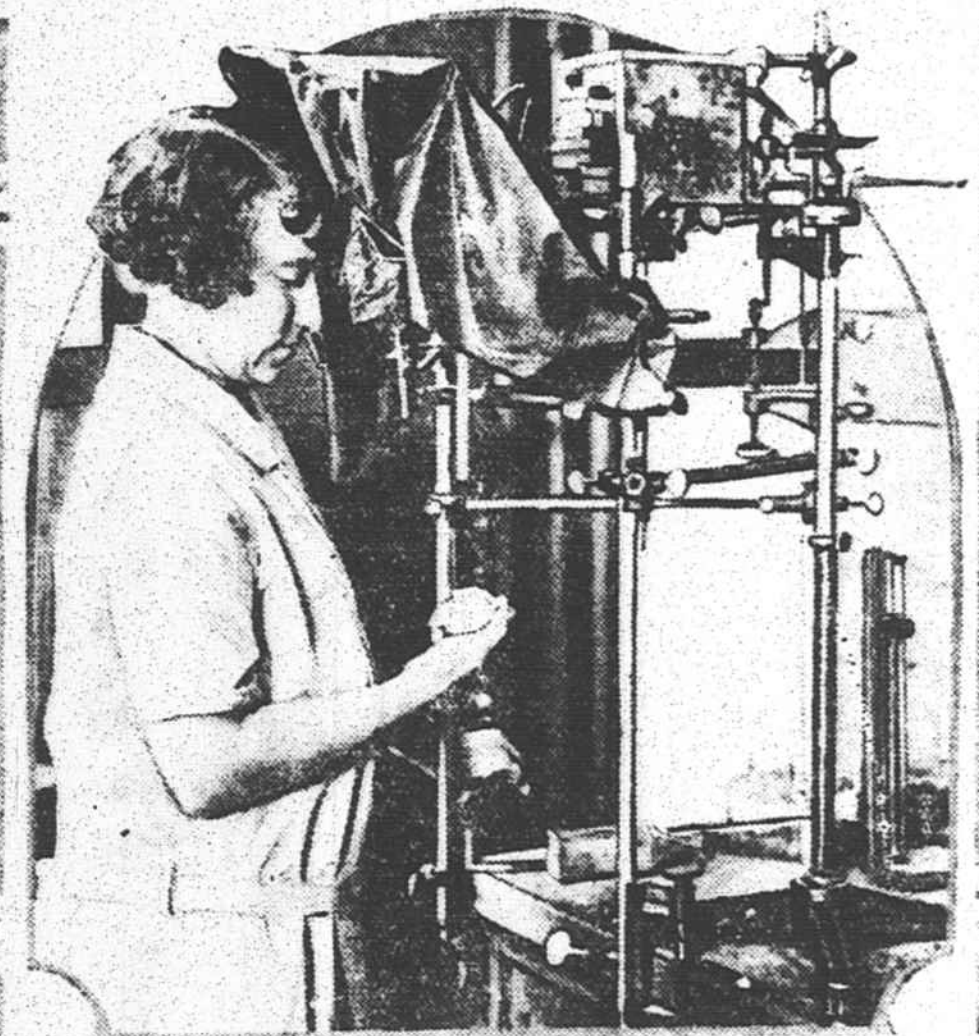

PAUL WRITES TO THE PHILIPPIANS.

LESSON TEXT—PHIL. 3:7-16. 4:3. GOLDEN TEXT—"I can do all things through Christ, which strengtheneth me."—Phil. 4:13.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Paul and His Friends. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Unifying the Best Things. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Christian's Goal.

The contents of the epistle may be summarized as follows:

- 1. Salutation (1:1-2). 2. Thanksgiving and prayer in which he shows his loving interest in them (1:3-11). 3. Triumph of the gospel in spite of opposition (1:12-20). 4. Duties enjoined (1:27; 2:1-18). 5. Paul's promise to send Timothy and Epaphroditus (2:19-30). 6. Exhortations and warnings (3:1-4:1). 7. Renewed appeal for unity (4:2-9). 8. Personal matters (4:10-23).

The essential message of Philippians is a revelation of the mind which should dominate the Christian.

All Things Loss for Christ (3:7-9). The occasion for this remarkable declaration was the claim of the Philippians for legal recognition as citizens of Rome.

Paul's Present Desire (3:10-16). Paul's present desire was to be with the Philippians, but he was hindered by his chains.

The Power of His Resurrection. It is an evidence thought over personal afflictions. It is the expression of the life of Christ through righteousness. It is the power to gain the mastery over sin and death.

Fellowship of His Sufferings. Not only identified with Christ in His sufferings by imitation, but that he might lift up that which is behind of the afflictions of Christ (3:10; 1:24).

Attain Unto the Resurrection of the Dead (3:11). This will be accomplished when the Lord comes (1 Thess. 4:13-17).

Pressing Toward the Goal (rv. 12-16). Paul clearly grasped the meaning of his perfection in Christ, yet he was keenly conscious of his personal limitations. Herein is expressed the true law of progress in the spiritual life.

Consistent of Limitations (v. 12). The first step towards progress is to be profoundly dissatisfied with personal attainments. No intellectual movement is ever made by those who think they know enough, who are satisfied with what they have.

Resolute Determination to Gain the Goal (v. 14). He declares: "This one thing I do." The ideal controls the man. "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." When once the mind is guarded and controlled by the peace of God, it will dwell upon spiritual things.
