BREVARD MUNICIPAL BAND

The summer season is over; the bi-weekly concerts on the band stand have come to a close. Prof. Cutler's time is up, having been with the band as instructor for one year. He has been remarkably successful in training the boys to a high degree of excellence in so short a time, and under the more or less difficulties encountered in getting them together for practice and for the concerts.

Hitherto the membership fees have been sufficient to maintain the band in a modest way, but this is no longer possible on account of its decrease in numbers. Some of the boys have gone to Florida, others have gone to school, thus decreasing the membership from about forty to fifteen. It seems a case of securing a good many new members, or of disbanding altogether.
