SUPT. HENDERSON EXPLAINS STANDING OF HIGH SCHOOLS

In order to clarify the school situation, and make plain the status of Transylvania High School children, Superintendent Henderson has prepared for publication the following statement:

"A number of high school boys and girls and a considerable number of parents have questioned me concerning the standing of our high schools with an eight months school term. It has occurred to me that there may be many who are anxious to know just what is our educational status. Therefore on taking this occasion and method of presenting a few facts concerning our schools and their accredited standing.

"The Public School law of North Carolina, Article 1, Section 2, states that 'The school system of each county shall consist of eleven years or eleven grades, and shall be graded on the basis of a school year of not less than 160 days.' An eight months term, therefore is a standard term, both in the elementary and high school work; and full credit is given pupils who complete a grade in an eight months term. Any grade can be completed in eight months (bearing some supplementary work) if the pupils will attend regularly

and study and work diligently and the teachers will put in the full six hour day as the law and the ruling of the Board of Education require.

"In the high school, the recitation periods must be 45 minutes with an eight months term, whereas with nine months term the recitation period may be only 40 minutes. With nine months school term in both high and elementary schools, are classed in Group 1 whereas with eight months term in either high or elementary schools, or both the high schools are classed in Group 2. There are two classes of high schools in both Group 1 and Group 2. These are class A and class B. Both of our county high schools, Brevard and Rosman, will be rated in Group 2 class A, and full credit will be given to all boys and girls who graduate from these schools, and upon these credits they can enter any A grade college in this country.

"The indications are that our high schools will have by far the largest attendance this year since the organization of these schools; and we are looking forward to a successful year in the work of our schools."

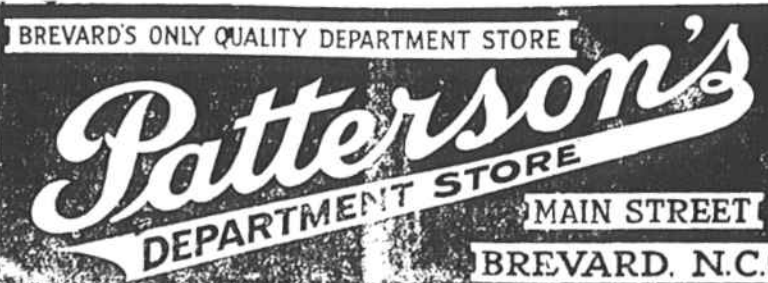
