

Full Proceedings of Convention W. N. C. Log Rolling Association

DEATH WARRANT OF LORD JESUS CHRIST

Copy of Famous Document Taken from a Century-old Newspaper

The Courier and State Times, of the following account of the death warrant of Jesus Christ to Pontius Pilate, which was clipped from a newspaper almost one hundred years old. It is being re-published in belief that it will prove interesting to our readers.

The account follows:
The Courier des Etats Unis, of date, says: Chance has put in our hands the most interesting and interesting judicial document, of all times, that has ever been recorded in human annals; that is the death warrant of our Lord Jesus Christ. We transcribe the document from a copy of the translation.

SENTENCE
"Rendered by Pontius Pilate, Governor of Lower Gallilee, Jesus of Nazareth shall suffer death on the cross."

"In the year seventeen of the empire of Tiberias Caesar, and in the month of March, the city of Jerusalem; Anens and Caiaphas, priests, sacrificers of the people of God, I, Pontius Pilate, Governor of the praetory, condemn Jesus of Nazareth to die on the cross because two thieves—the great and the small—evidence of the people say:

1. He is a seducer.
2. He is seditious.
3. He is the enemy of the people.
4. He calls himself, falsely, son of God.
5. He calls himself King of the Jews.
6. He entered into the temple followed by a multitude bearing palm branches in their hands.

Order the centurion, Quintus Cornelius, to lead him to the place of execution.

Forbid any person, whomsoever poor or rich to oppose the death of Jesus.

The witnesses that signed the death of Jesus are:

1. Daniel Robani, a Pharisee.
2. Jannus Honorable.
3. Capet, a citizen.

Jesus shall go out of the city by the gate "Strenuous."

The above sentences are engraved on a copper plate. On one side written these words: "A similar plate is sent to each of these tribes." It was found in an antique of white marble, while excavating the city of Aquilia, in the Kingdom of Naples in the year 1825, and discovered by the Commission of Arts, attached to the French army. At the expedition of Naples it was found enclosed in a box of silver in the sacristy of Courtem.

The French translation was made by the members of the Commission of Arts. The children read earnestly that the plate might be taken away from them. The quest was reported to the Emperor of the army. Mr. Demone, one of the savans, caused a plate to be engraved of the model, on which he engraved the above sentence. The sale of his collection of curiosities was bought by Lord Howard of Effingham for 5,884 francs.
