Weaver Starts Measure Through For Establishment of Fish Hatchery

Congressman Zebulon Weaver introduced a bill in the House of Representatives on February 20 for the establishment of a fish hatchery and fish cultural station in Pisgah Forest, in this county.

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the sum of \$75,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby, authorized to be appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of one or more fish hatcheries and fish-cultural stations in the State of North Carolina for the propagation of trout and bass at suitable points to be selected in the discretion of the Secretary of Commerce, including the purchase of sites, or the use of sites already owned by the United States at or near Pisgah Forest, in the County of Transylvania, North Carolina, and necessary equipment, and such further sums as may hereafter be necessary for the maintenance of such hatcheries and fish-cultural stations are hereby authorized to be appropriated."

To the end that Congressman Weaver's interests in this section may be fully appreciated the following letter was received along with the bill for the establishment of the fish hatchery: "Mr. James F. Barrett, Editor, 'Brevard News,' Brevard, N. C. 'Dear Jim: 'I am enclosing copy of bill which I have introduced for the establishment of a Federal fish hatchery at or near Pisgah Forest, in Transylvania County. I thought probably the people of your section might be interested in this, and if you wish I would be glad to have you use a statement in regard to it in the next issue of your paper.' 'I have had a bill pending in Congress for some years about this matter. However, due to the economy program of the administration the chairman of the committee has heretofore advised me that it would be impossible to pass any project of this kind. However, he now tells me that he feels that legislation providing for additional fish culture stations in a number of States should be enacted.

"There are many individual bills pending before the committee asking for fish hatcheries throughout the United States. Congressman White, of Maine, is the chairman of this committee, and he now tells me that he is planning to ask his committee to report out a bill providing for a lump sum appropriation for fish hatcheries throughout the country to be expended over a period of five years, and to be used by the Secretary of Commerce where such hatcheries may be most useful.

"I am exceedingly anxious to have the particular bill which I enclose or some legislation of this kind passed. I feel sure that under general legislation we can qualify and secure a hatchery in our section. It is greatly needed as you know to take care of the hundreds and hundreds of miles of trout streams in Western North Carolina. The Government itself needs a station there for the purpose of supplying the streams on its own land, and the demands from private owners are very great and in fact cannot now be supplied from the present facilities.

"Western North Carolina is the great playground of the east. There is no part of it that is more beautiful than Transylvania County. This county has hundreds of miles of trout streams which would be most attractive for visitors and valuable to our own people if kept properly stocked, and I am very hopeful of securing legislation which would accomplish this, and expect to try to work it out at a very early date.

"I am always glad to have the Brevard News. It is a splendid paper and reflects the energy and fine spirit of Brevard and Transylvania County. I wish for it a continued success, which it richly deserves. 'Very sincerely yours, 'Zebulon Weaver'"

Buchanan spent some time here about a year ago in this work, and it is said the State considers the work in this county so important that there is strong probability of the appointment of another health officer to continue the work here.

In an effort to curtail all expense possible, the county found it necessary to discontinue the public health work, and Dr. Buchanan left for other fields. Just when the work is to begin could not be learned. Those interested in the work, however, have expressed the wish that the State would institute the work at an early date.
