## EXPLOSION PUTS 3 IN HOSPITAL

Fire and explosion in a Hendersonville dry cleaning plant early Sunday morning resulted in injury to three men who were in the basement of the building at the time and in severe shock to a woman who was in the rear of the building with her husband and child; owners of the building. All were safely removed from the burning building with only slight injuries, the three men being taken to Patton Memorial hospital for treatment.

It had not been determined what caused the explosion and consequent fire. The estimated loss to the building, which is said to be covered by insurance, was \$5,000. The shock from the explosion was felt several blocks away and was heard practically all over Hendersonville, it is said.

## MAY OBTAIN DAMAGES FOR RAILROAD ACCIDENT

Movement has been started in congress to obtain monetary damages for Mack Corn, who lost a leg in a railroad accident during the war period when the government was operating the railways. The injured man was but a boy at that time, being only 13 years of age. Corn was then living at Tuxedo, but has been living in Brevard for some time.

Congressman Pritchard introduced a bill in congress for payment of \$5000 damages to Corn. R. R. Fisher is attorney for Mr. Corn.

## FEDERAL REPORTS ON WORK DONE IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

much as the "federal interest" would indicate, that is to say, one-tenth, one-half or the whole; that the "federal interest" concerns commerce, navigation, or water power. "The first question to come up was the moral liability on the part of the United States to remove certain jetties placed in the river by the government. The answer came back at once that the jetties, or dikes, were placed in the river at the request of the people of our district. "This we could not deny.

"However, we succeeded in securing almost positive assurance that a bill introduced by Congressman Pritchard would be attached to or included in an omnibus bill which carries authority and direction to the War Department to make this survey and investigation; and make report on same. This bill has been introduced and will in all probability pass congress at an early date.

"Should we fall in this plan to get the river cleared, our next step for relief would be for all of the property owners on French Broad river whose property is damaged by flood waters, to become co-plaintiffs in a suit brought against the United States in the court of claims at Washington, seeking damages for failure on the part of the United States to take out these jetties or properly maintain them.

"I think that efforts in regard to the French Broad river project have already made assurance of some fruit and that if we push and pull with Representative Pritchard we can drain this valley land and in this way improve our county.

"I interviewed Col. Sherman and Mr. Yarnell, of the Forestry division of the government in regard to obtaining an increase in revenues from the Pisgah National Forest Game Preserve, or that boundary of same lying in this county. I found that the government owns 82,000 acres in this county, and pays to the school fund of this county one-fourth of all gross receipts from said forests. From this I find that Transylvania county received the sum of \$297 and some few cents for last year.

"The Forestry division officials then informed me that if it proved burdensome for the small counties like Transylvania to permit the government to take more lands in bond, then they would make no further purchases until advised by the county commissioners that the county can afford for them to take.

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
