

CHARLESTON, S. C., HOME-COMING WEEK

Charleston, S. C., March 4.—Mayor Thomas P. Stoney of Charleston, has proclaimed April 10-13 as the joint celebration of the 250th Anniversary of the official settlement of Charleston on its present site and the 260th celebration of the founding of the Province of Carolina under the Lords Proprietors.

In a letter to Mayor Whitshire—the chief executive of Charleston, after expressing the wish that his honor and his citizens may find it expedient to visit Charleston during the joint celebration, which falls concurrently with Charleston's famous garden season, sends out a call to all South Carolinians and to Charlestonians in particular, who are residing in this city to return for a general "home coming" on this occasion.

Charleston was first settled on the west bank of the Ashley River by English colonists under William Sayle in April 1670, and in 1680 the settlement was officially changed to Oyster Point on the southern extremity of the peninsula which is now the present site of Charleston.

Charleston is one of the few American communities which has preserved, unspoiled, its colonial atmosphere and is noted not only for its beauty of architecture and its wealth of garden estates but as the locale of many battles and engagements during the colonial and Indian campaign and the war between the states.

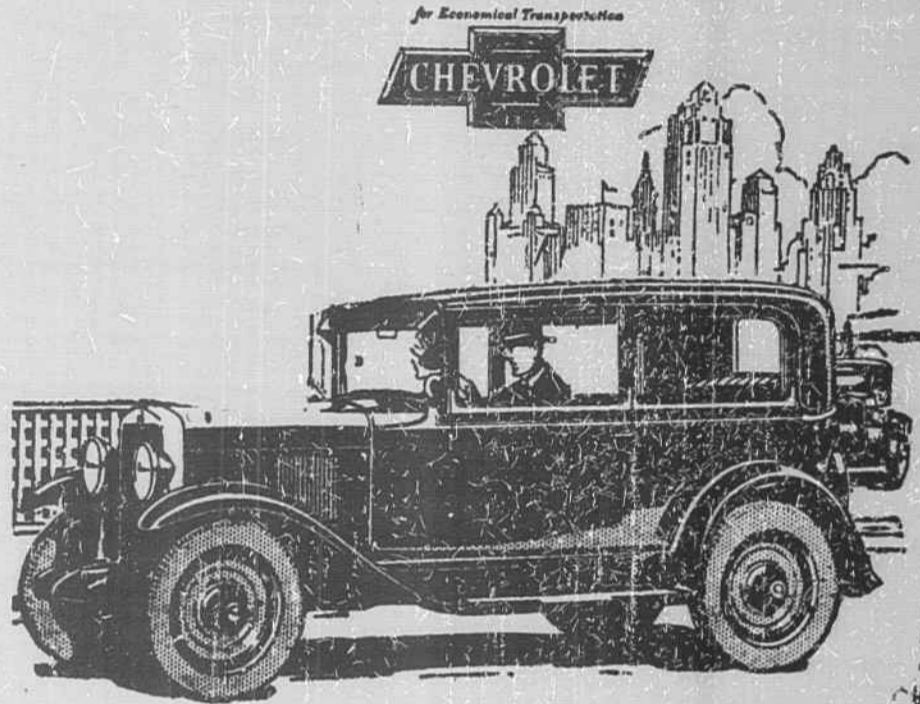
