NEW REGISTRATION IN CEDAR MOUNTAIN BOX

C. C. Kilpatrick, Chairman, Gives Important Facts
About Primary

Friday, May 23, is the last day any candidate may file his notice, and be eligible to enter the primary to be held on June 7.

Saturday next is the last day to register for voting in the primary. Cedar Mountain township is the only township where a new regis-tration has been ordered.

Voters whose names are on the registration book in any township in the county (except Cedar mountain) and who have not moved from one township to another, or from one voting precinct to another, since last election, can vote without registering.

All voters, in both parties, living in Cedar Mountain precinct, must register in order to vote in the primary

Any citizen who has moved into the county since last election must register, if they vote in the primary.
Any citizen who has moved from one precinct to another since last election must register for this com-

regardless of the fact that their announcements have been running in the press. All candidates must file with the county board of elections. All republican candidates selected in convention must also file with the
