Brevard gave Balfour their second decisive defeat Saturday at the latter's home, when a 24-11 score was piled up by the locals in a game that lasted from "some time after lunch time" to some time after supper time or dinner time or whatever one chooses to call the evening meal.

On Saturday previous, at Brevard, the locals ran up a score of 16-4 against the Balfour aggregation, when, as was the case in Saturday's game, the local boys hit everything that came along.

Batting averages for Brevard boys went up high in Saturday's game, every man on the team getting one or more hits for a total of 20. Clayton, all-round Brevard player, held Balfour in hand well throughout the game, keeping hits scattered with the exception of two innings, when four and three runs were scored.

Batting honors went to J. Schuchner and Clayton, the former getting three walks, three singles and a horse collar; Clayton getting one homer, two doubles, one single, one free trip and two charged against him out of his many times up.

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT Gal. 5:22 FAITH

What does St. Paul mean here by FAITH? "There are two meanings to the word:

Faith in God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost is the foundation of our fidelity or trustworthiness in the life of service, and that service is best expressed in the well known answer to the question, What is thy duty towards God? My duty towards God is to believe in Him, to fear Him, and to love Him, with all my heart, with all my mind, with all my soul, and with all my strength; to worship Him, to give Him thanks, to put my whole trust in Him, to call upon Him, to honour His Holy Name and His Word, and to serve Him truly all the days of my life."

There is a monastery and refuge for travelers on the summit of the Alpine Pass of St. Bernard in Switzerland. There the monks live all the year through, devoting themselves to the entertainment of strangers and in the winter going forth with their great dogs, trained for the purpose to help travelers lost in the snow. In the building there is a stained window, representing three dogs who perished in trying to succor travelers. At the foot are the words, Fideliten, Fortilen, Feliciten, faithful, strong, happy. Pray then to the Holy Spirit for three things that you may be Trustworthy, Strong and Cheerful in God's Service!

But Faith is not merely the foundation of duty and service, it is the only support in those three-fold trials which will meet you at every step, and grow in number and force. But remember the promise, "As thy days so shall thy strength be."

"First comes spiritual suffering—which we call temptation and sin. In the first, trust your Heavenly Father. Ask the Holy Spirit to teach you that "there hath no temptation taken you, but such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." "Seek His help to endure temptation" that you may "receive the Crown of Life" and pray that He may be with you as He was with your Saviour, in the wilderness of this life of temptation.

"And then when perhaps you have fallen into sin, and are tempted to despair of forgiveness, seek Him for

the blessed assurance of full and free pardon through the precious blood of Christ, which He will teach you is yours. Yes, yours, though you have fallen as deeply as a David or a Magdalene, wandered as far as the Prodigal, and given way in moments of weakness like Peter—yours on the simple condition of Faith, Penitence and Confession, so that you need never be discouraged.
