MASTERS, THE LITERARY BUZZARD OF THE AGE.

February 12th, being the anniversary of the birth of the Great Emancipator, is a sacred day in the country which Lincoln served with such signal honors. His devotion to his country has been an inspiration to millions, and his service to his nation firmly established human freedom not only in America, but throughout the world.

Now comes a literary buzzard, a man by the name of Edgar Lee Masters, and makes effort to destroy the memory of Abe Lincoln by picturing the great statesman as being nothing at all like history paints him. "A weakling," "an awkward social climber," "with little ability," and similar terms are used by Masters in describing the great Lincoln.

Edgar Lee Masters is a name that would suggest just such a character as Masters. Like the buzzards pick on the bones in forest and field, Masters, the literary buzzard, must select the name of a man dead and gone, and swoop down upon it, in buzzardly fashion, to fill his literary dinner pail.

Derogatory Edgar Lee Masters. His book is nauseating, his picture is sickening, and his suggestions create a feeling akin to that experienced by seasickness.

THIS BLESSED COMMUNITY OUGHT TO BE INSPIRATION.

All that it takes to make a man's heart fill with gratitude for the many blessings enjoyed in this community, is to take a trip through the drought-stricken regions of the nation. A ride through the beautiful Shenandoah Valley discloses human suffering as we have never known it here. Great farms and fields and pastures, once green with the products which brought great wealth, are now literally burned to dust with the dry winds of 1930. And this Shenandoah Valley section is not suffering as much as the area stretching westward, across Tennessee, Kentucky and into Kansas.

It is hard for us to visualize a farm family purchasing water from trucks that haul this precious fluid for miles and miles. Such conditions are now existing, and have been existing for many months, within a few hundred miles of our own blessed community here.

Transylvania county is rich—rich in pure water, in bracing air, in an abundance of good things to eat. A few families here are destitute, but the great community heart has responded in wonderful manner in relieving these families. Let's not grumble any more. Let's thank God more devoutly than ever before for the manifold blessings bestowed upon us, for we are, indeed, blessed, thrice blessed.

SALARY REDUCTION NOT THE PROPER SOLUTION.

Officials of the State Federation of Labor in meeting at Greensboro Sunday take issue with Governor Gardner's plan of salary reduction for all state officials and state employees. We believe the Federation officials are right. There may be some instances wherein the state employe or official is receiving a salary out of proportion to the worth of the man or woman, but we believe such instances are rare. The point raised by Federation officials is that of the state's example. It is contended that private employers will follow suit, if the state makes salary reduction its way of reducing expenses.

It would be better by far if the state would reduce its working forces by several thousand, and require each employe or official to do a full man's work. Whatever waste there is in operation of the state's business lies much more in the multiplicity of employes, than in the amount of salaries paid. To lay off all those who are not really serving the state and save the entire amount of these salaries would effect a greater saving than a reduction in salaries would bring about.

There are many bureau and commission members, drawing state salaries, whose services could most easily be dispensed with, to say nothing

of the army of clerks whose services are not really needed at all. A large per centage of the state's payroll could be chopped entirely off, thus effecting a real saving.
