High Class Seed Variety May Be Produced Profitably In Transylvania

For an agricultural section or community to prosper and grow, as anything should, it must become a unit, have a name, the primary product of the community should signify the place from all others. Examples of such places are:

which furnishes the people educational, social, recreational, and business advantages or they can not grow as they should.

The high altitude of the western part of Transylvania county makes it not only possible for the highest quality of table potatoes to be produced but also seed potatoes—yes, certified seed potatoes. There is a great demand for these potatoes for both table use and seed just across the mountain 25 miles away in the cotton belt of South Carolina. From a commercial standpoint up until three years ago few potatoes had been grown in this section. Since then just a few cars have been shipped each season. During the past school year the Vocational Agricultural Department of the Rosman high school put considerable emphasis on potato production. Not only were the boys taught potatoes but each Tuesday night in the class room there was assembled a large group of grown men—dirt farmers—studying the essential facts about how to grow more potatoes for less money. As a result of the interest taken there is three times as many potatoes planted in the Rosman community as ever before.
