BOARD OF HEALTH PASSES ON RESORTS

With the coming again of warm weather, many people begin to think of desirable places to spend a pleasant vacation, even as Andy Gump goes yearly to Shady Rest. This accounts for the unusually large number of communications received at the State Board of Health, both from in and out of the State, asking for a list of approved North Carolina summer camps and in many cases the relative sanitary rating of each.

According to Dr. Warren H. Booker of the State Board of Health the North Carolina camps are not excelled by those of any state in the Union. At the same time Mr. Booker points out that only about half the summer camps in the State are "approved." In North Carolina there is no sanitary rating given summer camps as a case in hotels and cafes. A camp is simply approved or disapproved. Before it is placed on the approved list a camp must be visited by a representative of the State Board of Health and all the sanitary conditions found to meet certain minimum requirements. Special attention is paid to water supplies and sewage disposal, and every precaution is taken to safe guard the health of those who visit these camps.

In the interest of public health the State Board of Health will be glad to mail a list of approved camps in North Carolina to anyone upon request and advises everyone contemplating a vacation in any of the North Carolina camps to be sure it is on the approved list before planning to spend a vacation there.

Wake Forest, May 18—Two sons of Transylvania county citizens are among the 133 Wake Forest College seniors slated to receive degrees next June. They are William M. Grogan, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Grogan, and Richard H. Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. C. Moore, both of Brevard.

These men have been active in college life on the Baptist campus. Both are members of the Euzelian literary society. Grogan belongs to the varsity inter-collegiate debate team which last year won the state championship in North Carolina. Moore is president of the Euzelian literary society and belongs to the track team.

Wake Forest has the distinction of being the oldest and largest college for men in the United States. This session it has 300 students enrolled from 95 North Carolina counties and foreign areas.

Baileigh, May 18—The State Board of Equalization, meeting the past week to begin allotment of teachers and making other plans for the public schools next year, adjourned to reconvene on Wednesday of this week to continue its work. Indications are, from reports already in, that around 900 more teachers would be required next year to take care of the greatly increased attendance the year just ended. The board has started along the line of "splitting the difference" and awarding about 400 additional teachers. Since teachers are allotted on the basis of the attendance the year before it is pointed out that the teacher load would not be increased, in fact, would be reduced from the past year, by the addition of 400 teachers, unless there is an unexpectedly large attendance next year.
