1499—Nicholas Machiavelli, noted Italian statesman and essayist, born; died 1527.

A Prodigal Returns.

Interviewed at Kansas City Mr. William L. Wilson, one of the authors of the Wilson-Gorman tariff law, said of the coming campaign:

"It is to be McKinley and Bryan. Mr. Cleveland will not allow his name to be mentioned and Dewey will not get an opportunity to see himself voted down.

"Bryan will be nominated, but conditions are so changed that the campaign will be on new lines. Both sides have so many new conditions to confront that the old tactics will not do. I think the Democrats will win. We shall go into the fight solid."

This, we suppose, is Mr. Wilson's way of announcing that though he strayed from the fold in 1896, he has come back home and will behave himself this year. The Palmer-Buckner Republicans are finding other pebbles on the beach besides themselves.

Captain Patton says a man doesn't have to wear a button to show his politics. That's fortunate; otherwise the captain would have to change buttons every few months.

A combination anti-amendment and anti-education button is what the Black-and-Tans need.

Superintendent Venable's teachers institute promises to be a great success. The program is excellent, and the county teachers are taking a most lively interest in the work.

The Republican primaries in Henderson township, Vance county, elected a solid negro delegation to their county convention, though the white Republicans tried hard to keep the negro in the background during this campaign. Here in Buncombe county the Black-and-Tans sat on the negro and wouldn't admit him to the convention. In Eastern North Carolina the Republican party is dominated by the negro.

A Jump of \$1500.

The auditor's subscription statement for today shows a jump of \$1500. A few more such jumps will land the \$25,000 that the people of Asheville have determined to raise to build a great auditorium.

In view of the small amount of work thus far done by the subscription committees and of the comparatively small number of people seen the amount raised to date is very encouraging, and should stimulate the committees to increase their efforts.

Up to date the late Grover Cleveland has not refused to accept the Republican nomination for vice-president.

The "rooters" in the senate have blocked the legislation asked for by the president, rather than put any obstacles in the way of the executive council of Porto Rico in serving pie where it will do the most good.

"Honest" John Wanamaker has again served his country well. He bought the postmaster generalship in Harrison's cabinet with a \$400,000 contribution to the campaign fund. Now he has bought Hanna's vote against Quay by a million dollar contribution to the McKinley campaign fund. Pennsylvania is safe anyhow, and Quay can't hurt the Republican party much outside that state, while the million dollars will be handy for use elsewhere.

A Salt Lake City paper speaks of a "rumored" wedding in that city. Perhaps Brigham Roberts is going to make an addition to his family.

BUILDING NOTES IN VARIOUS CITIES

WHAT THE CITY Y. M. C. ASSOCIATIONS ARE DOING.

The association building at Columbia, S. C., was opened February 24, and is a great boon to the work.

Fortmouth, Va., has let the contract for a \$17,750 building.

Joplin, Mo., has a building canvass and has already raised \$10,000, one-half of which was given by Hon. J. W. Taylor.

Augusta, Ga., will now complete its building, which was begun some years ago.

Knoxville, Tenn., is settled in its new quarters. Although the building is rented, extensive improvements are being made.

The C. E. societies of Memphis furnished the parlors of their new building at a cost of \$1013. The E. L. societies will spend \$500 on the gymnasium and the B. Y. P. U. will spend \$200 on the boys' room.

BLACK DIAMOND ROAD'S PROSPECTS

AMERICAN CAPITAL READY TO UNDERTAKE THE WORK.

Knoxville, Tenn., May 3.—In an interview today President Harrison of the Boone Black Diamond Railroad company stated that if the financing plan of T. C. Dickinson to interest English capitalists in the road fails, American capitalists are ready to undertake the building of the road.

Dickinson's option on the rights of way expires September 20, and if the English capital is not ready then the options will be transferred to a large American syndicate, whose agent has been here securing information as to the road. This is Boone's proposed road from the Ohio river to Port Royal, S. C.
