This Date in History—May 21.

1691—Cornelius van Tromp, famous Dutch admiral, died. Cornelius was the son of the more celebrated Dutch commander, Martin Harpertzen. He fought in company with De Ruyter, his father's chief rival and successor, and on the death of De Ruyter became lieutenant admiral general of the United Provinces.
1776—Elizabeth Gurney (Fry), Quaker preacher and prison reformer, born near Norwich, England; died 1845.
1849—Maria Edgeworth, English novelist, died in County Longford, Ireland; born in England 1767.
1894—General Phil Cooke, a distinguished Confederate veteran, died in Atlanta; born 1817.
1896—Mrs. Clara Wieck Schumann, widow of the composer and herself a noted pianist, died at Frankfurt-on-the-Main; born 1819.
1899—Admiral Dewey sailed from Manila on the cruiser Olympia on his voyage home.

Luther's Delegates?

What is the test of Democracy in this great fight for white supremacy in North Carolina? What is of greater importance and means more to North Carolina this year, the election of a local Democratic ticket or the adoption of the constitutional amendment?

In the meeting of precinct number 1 on Saturday night at the court house that most active opponent of the constitutional amendment, D. M. Luther, who for several months has been making anti-amendment speeches and denouncing Democrats, was a conspicuous participant, and his vote had the effect of changing the entire delegation; had he not been at the primary the delegation would have been different.

Should an active, bitter opponent of the vital matter in this campaign, an issue submitted for ratification by a Democratic legislature and endorsed by the Democratic state convention as well as by every Democratic county convention, be allowed to take part in a Democratic primary? No.

The delegation elected at that meeting Saturday night should not be allowed to sit in the convention.

If that delegation is seated then Luther will go on making speeches against the amendment, saying that he is a Democrat and proving it by the fact that he attended a Democratic primary and voted for a delegation that was seated without protest.

Dr. Melver says in a letter that he is not a candidate for the presidency of the University of North Carolina.

That is no reason why the trustees of the university should not offer the position to him. He is by far the best man in the state for the place. The position is one that needs executive ability of a very high order and Dr. Melver has it.

The Citizen hopes, and is inclined to believe, that if the matter is put to Dr. Melver in the right way, with the assurance that the state needs him at the head of the university, he would accept. The position is too important for the interests of the university to be jeopardized by his refusal.

The beautiful manner in which civil service works under the McKintley administration was shown a few days ago when a postoffice clerk was brought to Asheville from New Bern and jumped over the heads of every one on the eligible list. Such strict adherence to civil service rules makes the people respect civil service, doesn't it? Perhaps civil service rules are intended only for those without a political pull.

Trusts in Nebraska.

The supreme court of Nebraska has ordered that the briefs of attorneys for the Standard Oil company be stricken from the files for the reason that "they contain improper and offensive implications" toward the court. The court has also sustained the demurrer of the attorney-general to the petition of the Standard Oil company.

This, in effect, upholds the constitutionality of the Nebraska anti-trust law, and advances the suit, which is one to disbar the company from the state, to the point where the court will take testimony to prove that the Standard Oil company is a trust.

While Mark Hanna is saying that trusts are good things for the country a few state courts are taking the opposite view.
