IBERNIA PARK, VICTORIA'S SUBURB

BEAUTIFUL DOMAIN OF MORE THAN 75 ACRES.

Ibernia park, the beautiful woodland suburb of Victoria, deserves the introduction which its attractive new name will give to the public. The domain includes more than 75 acres, stretching from the line of Robert U. Garrett's property westward to the vicinity of the passenger station of the Southern railway. Mr. Garrett has extended his boundaries westward by the purchase of a section of the Ibernia road, and will develop the same in the near future for residence property.

Driving west along the Oakland road, to the new Ibernia road, which separates Mr. Garrett's new purchase from the larger section beyond, which is owned by the Asheville Land company, the observer beholds both to the right and left one long rolling sweep of finely timbered land, open on either side with a glorious outlook to the west and south, and almost equally lovely views stealing upon the eye at intervals over the housetops of the city toward the surrounding mountains. Every spot, it may be said, "is beautiful for situation", breezy groves, deliciously quiet, filled with the songs of birds, and the grounds dotted with numerous springs.

Ibernia road is a picturesque drive through the woods, leading directly to the Asheville street car line, so that the whole section is finely adapted to beautiful suburban homes. While not included in either Victoria or Asheville, it is in close touch with both, and its open outline by way of the new connecting roads, recently laid out and built by the Asheville Land company, affords a fresh and interesting drive-way to those intent upon seeing the best features of Asheville.

Several lots upon the larger tract will soon be improved for residences, and the new suburb will be opened for our growing city.
