NOTES FROM THE ASHEVILLE LIBRARY

INFORMATION FOR SOME OF THE LITERARY CLUBS.

The attention of the Friendly Dozen, Current Literature, Friday, Anne Hathaway and The Woman's club is called to the fact that if they will give copies of their programs for next winter's work into the library, subject cards will be made out so as to render available whatever books can be of service to them.

A contributor to the Atlantic Monthly tells us that "more books are published in France each year than in Great Britain and the United States combined; more books of a serious nature especially, since France publishes only a quarter as many novels as England, and only half as many as the United States. In pure learning and in science (in which latter, despite the deaths of the leaders of research, Pasteur and Charcot, she was never more earnest than now.) She is second only to Germany, and her competition with Germany is growing keener every day. The combined population of Great Britain, including Ireland, and of the United States in 1891, amounted to 191,362,439 persons; that of France in 1896 was 38,511,975, and of Germany in 1895, 52,279,915.

MRS. H. C. HUNT DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

SHE HAD LIVED IN ASHEVILLE NEARLY 30 YEARS.

Mrs. H. C. Hunt died at her residence, Mountain cottage, shortly after 12 o'clock today. It is expected that the funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock, the services to be conducted at the house.

Mrs. Hunt had been an invalid for several years, and had been critically ill several weeks.

Mrs. Hunt was Miss Laura Ellen O'Bryan. She was a native of Cincinnati, but came to Asheville nearly 30 years ago, and has been residing here since that time. Her husband and four children survive. The latter are, Mrs. Gaston Meares of Asheville, Mrs. Summers of Jacksonville, Edward H. and Rufus G. Hunt. The latter is stamp clerk in the Asheville postoffice. All the children were here today except Edward, who is in the Klondike.

PREPARING FOR HEAVY BUSINESS

THE NEW TRAINS PUT ON BY THE SOUTHERN.

Beginning tomorrow, a parlor car service will be inaugurated between Asheville and Charleston on trains Nos. 13 and 14 between Asheville and Spartanburg.

The new train between Asheville and Spartanburg, effective June 10, will carry sleepers between Asheville and Macon, Ga. It will leave Asheville at 9 p. m. and return at 10:05 a. m. The same train will run between Asheville and Morristown, leaving at 10:30 a. m. and returning at 7 p. m., carrying a sleeper running between Mobile and Asheville via Chattanooga and Birmingham. The latter is an addition to the service.

Beginning the same date, Nos. 21 and 22, Asheville to Morristown, will be run daily Sunday. The Southern is preparing for a heavy summer travel to Asheville.

NO DEVELOPMENTS IN MARSHALL STEAL

ALL BUT \$355 BELONGED TO MARSHALL COUNTY.

Postmaster Rollins, who has returned from Marshall, states that there are no developments in the postoffice robbery there.

The amount of the stolen money that belonged to the government has been ascertained to be \$125 in cash and \$230 worth of stamps. The remainder of the money belonged to the county, \$1900 in checks and several valuable deeds were taken. Payment of the checks has been stopped.

The lights in the store used by the robbers were seen by Mrs. Gage, but she supposed merely that the postoffice clerk was making up the mails.
