

WORK IN W. C. T. U. STATE CONVENTION

Oratorical Contest at Last Evening's Session.

THE PRIZE IS AWARDED TO MISS EMMA KING OF GUILFORD COLLEGE.

The session of the W. C. T. U. convention last evening was opened by a short devotional exercise conducted by Miss Florence Worth of High Point.

The feature of the evening was an oratorical contest between three young ladies. The contestants and their subjects were: Miss Mabel Heltman, "Neal Dow and His Times."

Miss Emma King, "International Arbitration and the Heroes of Peace." Miss Una Davis, "Woman's Relation to Temperance."

These essays were original and were distinctly good, and charmingly read, with clear, well modulated voice, and quiet bearing.

Rev. Mr. Rhodes of Littleton college, on behalf of the judges in the contest, presented the prize, a set of four books, to Miss Emma King of Guilford college, and in recognition of the excellence of the other essays presented to each of the other young ladies a book, Longfellow's poems.

Attorney Andrew Harris of Henderson made a much appreciated address to the convention, for which he received a vote of thanks from the committee on courtesies.

Miss Sallie Stephens of Goldsboro made a short, bright speech in the interest of increased membership in the union.

Mrs. Ross read the report of the committee on courtesies, thanking the railroads for reduced rates, Dr. Weaver for the use of Central church, Miss Smith and the choir for music, the Asheville Ladies for entertainment and the coffee over the Vanderbilt estate, Dr. Vines for his sermon Sunday morning, and other courtesies.

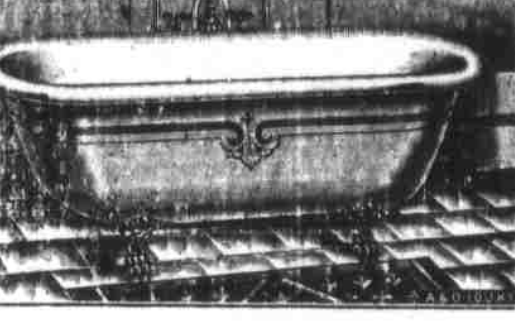
