DR. OTTLEY SPEAKS OF MEDICAL MISSIONARIES.

Last evening at the vesper service of the Y. W. C. A. Dr. Ottley spoke of the field for medical missionaries. To make clear the necessity for consecrated medical missionaries he gave a number of cases, showing how heathen doctors' treatment was different from that of our doctors. Especially in this field open to women doctors, for, as he said, many a woman would prefer to die rather than have a male physician. Dr. Erdman; "Jesus, I Come"; solo, Miss Hunt; benediction. The whole service was very impressive and very helpful.

Dr. Pauline Root, who gave such an interesting account of her experiences as a medical missionary in India, will conduct the vesper services at 7:15 this evening.

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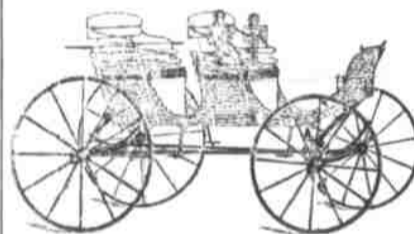
